Our alumnae are occupying prestigious positions all over the world in various walks of life as diplomats, lawyers, police officials, teachers and social activists to mention a few.

Situated in the fort city of Vellore in 9.23 acres of Campus area, the College stands self contained. - A three point scale was used to collect the data from the respondents. The scale was characterized as Good, Satisfactory and Poor. The data presented below shows the data from the first scale ie good.
- The entire data is converted into percentages for the analysis purpose.

CRITERION -I CURRICULAR ASPECTS

From the analysis of the data collected from the stakeholders [Teachers, Students, Parents, Research Scholars and Alumnae], we obtained the following results:

- Teachers opined that, Value based education is one of the programmes offered by the College (94%) and Syllabus framed is suitable for employment and good 95%.
- Students opined that, there is a linkage between syllabus of UG and scope for PG (98%) and Standard of curriculum offered is high and good.
- Parents opined that, Syllabus framed is suitable for employment (94%) and Value system is good in the college (88%).
- Research Scholars opined that, Standard of curriculum offered is high (95%), there is a linkage between syllabus of UG and scope for PG (90%) and Syllabus framed is suitable for employment and good.
- Alumnae opined that, Linkage between theory and practice is maintained (100%) and College offers wide ranges of courses and good (88%).

CRITERION -II TEACHING -LEARNING AND EVALUATION

From the analysis of the data collected from the stakeholders [Teachers, Students, Parents, Research Scholars and Alumnae], we obtained the following results:

- Alumnae opined that, there is Scope for research in the college is good (91%).

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 CURRICULUM DESIGN AND DEVELOPMENT

1.1.1 How are the institutional vision / mission reflected in the academic programmes of the College?

- The Institutional Vision and Mission is to cater to the needs of the holistic development of women, especially the poor and the marginalized. The College places prime importance in **rural poor**, serving the Dalits and the Tribals and the under privileged in general.
- To realize its Mission, the College strives to achieve balance in its curriculum which mainly consists of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular programmes.
- The curriculum for UG and PG Courses are designed based on the **Vision** and **Mission** of our college.
- While the curricular programmes mainly aim at the intellectual and moral
 development of the students, the co-curricular and extra-curricular
 programmes aim at their physical, psychological, social and spiritual wellbeing.
- **Intra and Inter Departmental Competitions** in Fine Arts, Annual Sports, Health and Cleanliness awareness programmes, Medical checkups, NCC training are given importance to contribute to the physical development of students.
- Programmes on **healthy inter-personal** relationships, self-confidence, counseling, yoga, stress-management, personality development, women's rights are conducted to address their psychological needs.
- No student is denied the opportunity of higher education on account of poverty.
- This **noble ideal** is realized by the intake of under privileged students and by catering to their social, psychological and intellectual empowerment, by way of scholarships, free education.
- The curriculum helps the **holistic development** of the students.

1.1.2 Describe the mechanism used in the design and development of the curriculum? Give details on the process. (Need Assessment, Feedback, etc)

The curriculum is planned meticulously by getting feedback from all the stakeholders-Students, teaching staff members, the college management and alumni through a centralized feedback system.

- ✓ **Feedback** is collected from the final year students at the end of the academic year which is utilized to modify the curriculum.
- ✓ The Departments assess the need to modify the existing syllabus, after conducting regular Department meetings prior to revising the syllabus.
- New subjects are introduced from the suggestions given by **Alumni**, **Industrial Experts** and **Subject Experts** from other colleges during **Board** of **Studies meetings** and from feedback received from students.

- ✓ The syllabi designed or modified are placed before the respective Boards of studies for approval. Any suggestions given by the members are incorporated after thorough discussion. The syllabus thus approved goes for approval by the college Academic Council and is implemented.
- The **Academic Council** comprises the Principal, a Member Secretary nominated by the Principal and four senior most faculty members from various streams act as facilitators. All the Heads of Departments participate in this council. The other members of the Academic Council include three University nominees, four prominent members from various walks of life, IQAC Coordinator and Student representative from UG and PG for an inclusive decision making.
- ✓ A Curriculum Development Cell is established to meet the needs of the student's community and the market demand. Policy decisions are made by the board of management of the college and discussed and approved by the governing body which directs the academic council and the Curriculum Development Cell (CDC) to execute the said decisions. The CDC discusses and designs the curricular frame work of different programmes based on the feedback from the students, staff, alumni, industrialists, subject experts and the guidelines given by the UGC, TNSCHE and Thiruvalluvar University.
- Feedback is received from PG students about their UG syllabus of this college and from M.Phil and Ph.D students about their PG syllabus to ensure continuity in learning, need based curriculum, and focus on competitive exams like NET, SET, GATE and so on.
- ✓ The annual **Academic Audits** help to evaluate the curriculum needs on a regular basis. The College carries out evaluation of its functioning every year. The academic audits were carried out from the year 2006-2007. A team of external subject experts belonging to different Departments carried out the academic audit. Their suggestions were taken into account during the revision of the curriculum. In addition to these subject experts; two more experts in educational management are also involved in the academic audit. The outcome of the audit is given as suggestions which are carried out in the following year.

1.1.3 How does the College involve industry, research bodies, and civil society in the curriculum design and development process? How did the College benefit through the involvement of the stakeholders?

- ✓ Participation of **Industry member** in the **Board of Studies** meetings also helps in a big way to formulate the syllabus according to industry needs without compromising the core aspects of a subject.
- ✓ The college **Research committee** actively participates in the development of research as per the Thiruvalluvar University norms.
- During the **alumni meetings**, the staff members get the feedback from alumnae on the syllabus in relation to the current trends that exist in the job market. In the same way whenever the employers come for campus recruitment, their feedback is sought on student performance and the curriculum. Their suggestions are taken into consideration while designing

the curriculum for the subsequent years. Academic experts visit the College and share their expertise and the current trends in their respective subjects with the management and staff.

The curriculum of our college is designed to enhance the confidence; ability and self reliance among the students which will make them perform to their best in academics. Each subject is planned to suit the needs of the global job market.

The Innovations and new programmes introduced in curriculum design and development by the various Departments are furnished below.

- ✓ The curricula of all (UG, PG, M Phil) courses are structured based on CBCS pattern. This enables the students to study Electives and Skill based papers apart from their majors.
- ✓ The UG students have the opportunity to learn at least Two Languages such as Hindi and Urudu of their choice apart from Tamil as the second language
- ✓ The **Department of Tamil** brought in a lot of changes in their syllabus to kindle a renewed interest in the rich literary background of Tamil, which is one of the oldest languages of the world and the lingua franca of the state. The following curriculum changes have been incorporated ,
 - "Ikkala Ilakiyam"- Poetry, Prose, Drama, short stories,
 - "Bakthi Ilakiyam"- Poems of "Alwargal "and "Nayanmargal"
 - "Neethi Noolgal"- Poems
 - "Kapiya Ilakiyangal"- *Iym-perum Kapiyam*, *Iyng-Sirugn Kapiyam*
 - "Sangaa Ilakiyam" ettu-Thogai, pathu-Pattu
 - "Mozhi Thiren"- Ilakiya varalaru, Eluthu pilai neekam, Kalai Chol akkam, Nool Mathipeedu,
 - Translation and Journalism
- ✓ **Department of English UG:** In 2010, the Department introduced 4 soft skills papers: Soft Skills for Linguistic Communication, Soft Skills for Interpersonal Communication, Soft Skills for Positive Traits, Essential Job Skills. From 2011 onwards, there is only one Soft Skills paper called "Soft Skills for Linguistic Communication at par with the Thiruvalluvar University Syllabus.
- ✓ Instead of written communication, creative writing was introduced for III year B.A. English during the academic year 2013-2014 for the students admitted from 2011-2012.
- ✓ **Department of English PG:** Introduced an elective paper "Language and Mind: Concepts and Application" to bring the emerging trends in linguisities and English language teaching into the fold of the existing syllabus rendering it up-to-date, so that the students have an edge over others while facing the job market.
- ✓ **Department of English (M.Phil):** During the academic year 2012-13 Action research was included as a part of Research Methodology for M.Phil students to enable them to do the field work.

- ✓ **Department of History:** Introduced Tourism as a major paper, because the field abounds in career opportunities and gives importance to the rich cultural heritage of India.
- ✓ **Department of Commerce:** Introduced four skill based papers viz., E-business and its applications (from 2010 11 onwards), E-commerce and its applications (from 2010- 2011 onwards), E-banking (from 2013 2014) and E- Marketing (from 2013-2014). The papers were introduced to facilitate a study of Information Technology Assisted Commerce on par with global standards and to improve the degree of employability for the students.
- ✓ **Department of Commerce PG:** Introduced Labour Legislations in place of Industrial relations during the II semester as an Elective paper.
- ✓ **Department of Chemistry (UG):** introduced in the year 2010 papers like Food Processing and Preservation, Water Analysis and Treatment, Applied Chemistry, Pharmaceutical Chemistry, Chemistry in Everyday life and Spectroscopy. The papers aim at taking the knowledge of chemistry beyond theoretical bounds to its practical applications in industries and also in day-to-day life.
- ✓ Further, **Department of Chemistry PG** introduced in the year 2012 papers like, Green Chemistry, Nanotechnology, Modern synthetic methods, Photo chemistry and Polymer Chemistry. The papers render the syllabus up-to-date and generate eco-awareness and also enable the students to engage in further research.
- ✓ **Department of Mathematics:** Introduced new skill based papers like Data structure and Algorithm, Number Theory and Math Lab, and Fuzzy Mathematics. The Department has been updating its syllabus to meet the emerging trends in the discipline.
- ✓ The **Department of Zoology** introduced new papers like Microbiology, Bioinformatics, Medical Laboratory Techniques and Bio-instrumentation. Further the Department also introduced a skill based paper "Aquarium fish keeping and Sericulture" in order to provide students with the knowledge base for setting up aquariums which is a profitable cottage industry ensuring self-employment. In the year 2008-09 Non-major papers were introduced like Vermiculture and Mushroom cultivation.
- ✓ The **Department of Biotechnology UG** introduced a paper on "Enzyme Technology" in the place of "General Awareness" which was a foundation course paper. The paper aims at bringing an understanding of Enzyme utilization and the commercial application of immobilized enzymes in industrial and clinical biochemistry. The Department also introduced three elective papers viz, Bio-fertilizer Technology, Herbal Technology, Food Processing Technology which are industry relevant courses.
- ✓ The **Department of Biotechnology PG** replaced Molecular and Developmental Biology with Cell and Molecular Biology which will enable the students to have an in-depth knowledge of cell and molecular biology, giving them a solid basis for understanding the living organisms.
- ✓ It also introduced a new paper "Natural Products and Intellectual Property rights" to ensure an understanding of the rich herbal wealth in India and

- the need to protect them through Intellectual Property Rights. Further, the PG board introduced an elective paper "Environmental Biotechnology" in the academic year 2012-2013 with a view to sensitize students on the harmful effects of environmental pollution and techniques of Bioremediation. The Department also made additions and deletions in their major papers to ensure the up-dating of the syllabus and to avoid redundancy.
- ✓ The **Department of Management Studies** introduced new papers in their curriculum like Total Quality Management, Hospital Management due to increasing Medical Tourism in Tamil Nadu. The papers were also introduced in view of the emerging importance of hospital management and its untapped potential in creating jobs. Papers like, Cyber Law, and Cyber Crime were introduced taking into consideration the widespread use of the internet and the growing menace of cyber crimes and the new cyber laws and measures in place to protect users of the net from the shadow criminals prowling cyberspace.
- ✓ The **Department of Biochemistry** introduced a skill based paper "Medical Laboratory Technology" and an elective paper "Principles of Ecology and Evolution", thereby providing the students with the necessary knowledge to face competitive exams.
- ✓ The **Department of Microbiology** introduced two new allied papers viz, Computers in Biology and Biostatistics, and Bioinstrumentation. The papers were introduced with a view to impart to the students the skills to use computers aiding future research.
- ✓ The Department also introduced Medical Laboratory Technology, as a skill based paper to create a practical knowledge of laboratory techniques.
- The **Department's PG** wing introduced Intellectual Property Rights, Biosafety and Research Methodology and two elective papers namely, Immuno-technology and Biological instruments. The papers were introduced taking into account the sensitive intellectual property rights issues and to ensure jobs in the pharmaceutical industries.
- The **Department of Computer Science** has been constantly striving to meet the evolving trends in Information Technology and Computers. Since the subject is enormously important in the IT era, The Department introduced papers like "Digital Electronics and Microprocessors" and "Introduction of Information Technology" in their UG courses. The Department also introduced papers like "Principles of Compiler Design", "Distributed Computing" and "Artificial Neural Network" in their PG courses so that the students can go for advanced computer studies.
- ✓ The **Department of Foods and Nutrition** introduced a new elective paper namely "Food Product Development and Marketing Strategies". This paper was introduced to bring out the importance of employability and entrepreneurship among the students.
- ✓ For **PG students** another elective paper "Nutraceuticals" was introduced instead of the non major paper. This is to bring out the unknown information on plants and their benefits which will also bring out the new trends in nutrition field.

- ✓ **Value Education and Environmental Science** are offered as mandatory components in the UG curriculum, which aims at making the students realize and understand their responsibilities towards themselves and the community.
- ✓ Apart from these, papers like Yoga for Women's Health I & II has been introduced as a Non- Major from the academic year 2014-15 by the Department of Physical Education.
- ✓ **Internship training** is included as part of the curriculum in their fourth semester with an extra credit of 1.
- ✓ There is an inclusion of **Mini Project** with extra credit of one to the UG Students in the sixth semester.
- ✓ Library hours are structured as a part of timetable for the students which help them to develop an in-depth knowledge of the subject and encourages the spirit of research.
- ✓ Most of the Departments have introduced a computer based subject, while in some Departments; a unit of a given paper provides linkages between that discipline and technology.
- ✓ To develop a sense of social responsibility and promote an understanding of social issues and foster participation in society, students are encouraged to take active part in extension activities like NSS, NCC, YRC, RRC, Enviro Club, Rotract Club, Career Guidance and Counseling Cell.

The faculty of DKM College strains every nerve to develop a curriculum to meet the needs of today and the near future. Education without values tends to become mechanical and produces automatons without souls. So the college also takes care to provide a value based education falling in line with the age-old institutions of higher learning, thus bringing out learned and morally upright individuals. An effective teaching methodology is practiced with special attention given to students who need extra support, thereby enabling them to work towards their academic goals.

1.1.4 How are the following aspects ensured through curriculum design and development?

* Employability

The curriculum of each academic programme is designed keeping in mind the **job prospects of students.** The student progression in our College is towards jobs in the teaching profession and in private companies, in government Departments after clearing TNPSC and UPSC exams and also to higher education. The syllabus revision and teaching innovations are done keeping this in mind. This has increased their chances of employment in the job market.

- ✓ A new elective paper namely "Food Product Development and Marketing Strategies" was introduced by Department of foods and nutrition to bring out the importance of employability and entrepreneurship among the students.
- ✓ A skill based paper "Aquarium fish keeping and Sericulture" was introduced by the Department of Zoology in order to provide students with

- the knowledge base for setting up aquariums which is a profitable cottage industry ensuring self-employment.
- ✓ **Hospital Management** was introduced by the Department of Management Studies to create employability in this field.
- ✓ The Department of Microbiology introduced **Medical Lab Technology** (MLT), as a skill based paper to create practical knowledge of lab techniques.
- ✓ Water analysis and treatment helps the students get employed in mineral water manufacturing companies, pollution control board, Tamilnadu Water Authority Development TWAD board Ranipet region specifically.
- ✓ **EDP training** is given on food processing for creating new entrepreneurs and employment in food processing industries.
- All our UG & PG programmes have been brought under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS from 2008-2009), with flexibility for the students in course options, outside her discipline; some credits need to be earned outside the group of related disciplines. For instance, a student studying in any one of the life sciences programme shall earn some credits from outside the group of life sciences, say, from physical sciences and social sciences. Choice Based Credit System was proved to be effective for students' overall progression. Firstly, the learners are contented that they are able to receive a multi-disciplinary learning experience as seen from their feedback reports. The same is also true for the faculty members since they get varied experience of addressing learners from various disciplines. The learners who have studied under this system have reported superior performance in the various competitive examinations they have appeared.
- The practice of evaluating and restructuring the syllabi every year has evidenced positive results over the past 6 years. The faculty experienced greater joy and fulfillment in carrying out their teaching profession. Creativity, innovation, and novelty in the teaching learning process have helped both staff and students to enjoy their given tasks. The teaching-learning process is strengthened through intensive laboratory courses, assignments, group seminars, field visits and project works, home works and subject quiz.
- The use of audio-visual equipments in **Smart Class Rooms** has been facilitated and they are more frequently used. The students use the internet facility widely for preparing their assignments. All the Departments are having library in addition to Central Library. The students coming from different streams are initiated into the programme of study through introducing lectures and orientation programmes. The students are exposed to more of practical work that equip them with confidence and competence. The campus has become more lively and vibrant with enthusiastic and exuberant youth, ready to prove their worth. Every day, there is something new to look forward to.

The curriculum for each course is planned to reinforce the knowledge of the students through **certificate courses** for employment by all the Departments to include papers like,

* Innovation

- The **Department of English** introduced a need based innovative soft skills paper called "Soft Skills for Linguistic Communication" to increase the employability skills of students making them fit for the job market.
- A well established Language lab is functioning with ORELL software to promote communication skills to face the job market.
- Four skill based papers viz., e-business and its applications (from 2010 2011 onwards), e-commerce and its applications (from 2011- 2012 onwards), e-banking and e-marketing (from 2013 2014) have been introduced by the **Department of Commerce** to impart techno-commerce to the students.
- Fuzzy Mathematics and Vedic mathematics has been proposed to be introduced by the **Department of Mathematics** to promote theoretical and practical knowledge among the students.
- Computer Lab (Aided) was established by the **Department of Mathematics** to promote wide practical knowledge among the students.
- The **Department of Bio-Technology** introduced three elective papers viz, Bio-fertilizer Technology, Herbal Technology, Food Processing Technology to create practical knowledge on the most enterprising subjects.

- New papers like Total Quality Management, Hospital Management, Cyber Law and Cyber Crime have been introduced by the **Department of** Management Studies. It is mainly to provide practical knowledge about the
 Hospital Management and to protect users of the net from the faceless
 criminals prowling cyberspace.
- A skill based paper "Medical Laboratory Technology" and an elective paper "Principles of Ecology and Evolution" were introduced by the **Department of Biochemistry**, thereby providing the students with the necessary knowledge to face competitive exams.
- Papers like "Digital Electronics and Microprocessor" and "Introduction of Information Technology" and a Skill based Practical "Multimedia" and "Microprocessor", were introduced by the **Department of Computer Science and Applications** in their UG courses and Computer Networks, Network Security, Cloud Computing, Wireless Technology, Mobile Computing, ASP.NET, Animations, DataMining and DataWarehousing and Android were introduced by the Department of Computer Science in their PG courses for updating and extending their theoretical repertoire.
- The **Department of Chemistry** has introduced a paper called "Water Analysis and Treatment" which systematically teaches the methodologies involved in the analysis, purification and processing of water, effective pollution control and so on. Apart from opening job opportunities in the pollution control board and the TWAD board, the paper has the added incentive of being an eco-friendly, enviro-awareness generating one. Further the PG Department introduced papers like Green Chemistry and Nanotechnology, launching the Department into futuristic research and development.
- "Tourism" has been introduced in the **Department of History** as an innovative paper that ventures into topics related to ticketing and tourism management which helps the students for self employability.
- The **Department of Zoology** introduced new papers like Microbiology; Bioinformatics introduced a skill based paper "Aquarium fish keeping and Sericulture" which is a profitable cottage industry ensuring self-employment.
- Value added courses like Medical Laboratory Techniques by Zoology and Microbiology Departments, Salesmenship by Department of Commerce and e-Tourism by Department of History during the current year.

* Research

In all the Departments, project work is included as part of the postgraduate curriculum, to promote research culture among the students. The research attitude among the students is inculcated through the inclusion of the research methodology paper. To promote excellence in research and consultancy the following papers were introduced in the curriculum.

• The **PG board of Biotechnology** introduced a new paper "Natural Products and Intellectual Property rights" to ensure an understanding of the rich herbal wealth in India and the need to protect them through Intellectual Property Rights. The PG board also introduced an elective paper

- "Environmental Biotechnology" in the academic year 2012-2013 with a view to sensitize students on the harmful effects of environmental pollution and techniques of Bio-remediation.
- An Elective paper "Nutraceuticals" was introduced instead of the non major paper. This is to bring out the unknown information on plants and their benefits which will also bring out the new trends in nutrition field.
- Papers like Green Chemistry, Nanotechnology, Modern synthetic methods and Photo chemistry, Polymer Chemistry, were introduced in the PG board of Chemistry. The papers render the syllabus up-to-date and generate ecoawareness and also enable the students to engage in further research.
- The **Department of Computer Science** introduced papers like Principles of Compiler Design, Artificial Neural Network, Computer Networks, Network Security, Cloud Computing, Wireless Technology, Mobile Computing, ASP.NET, Animations, Robotic, Data Mining and Data Warehousing, and Android in their PG courses so that the students can go for advanced computer studies and motivate Research also.
- New papers like Microbiology, Bio-informatics, Medical Laboratory Techniques and Bio-instrumentation were introduced by the **Department of Zoology** to motivate research.

1.1.5 How does College ensure that the curriculum developed address the needs of the society and have relevance to the regional / national developmental needs?

Since most students who join the College are first generation learners, and are predominantly from a rural background, they need special care and attention.

- To fulfill their needs and aspirations, the College offers special courses like communicative English. This gives them confidence to tackle the medium of learning, which is English.
- Every Department offers **special courses** in their own discipline to cater to the local needs. They include Leather Chemistry, Water Chemistry, and Tally for Accounting, SPSS for Social Sciences, Basic Computer courses and courses on multimedia.
- The students are also given training in theatre techniques and language lab. Group discussions, seminars and workshops are organized to motivate research aptitude among the students.
- To prepare the students for getting employment in Higher Education Institutions, the College is conducting NET, SET and TRB coaching classes.
- A **Study Circle** has been constituted by all PG Departments in which the staff and II year PG students are members. They meet during Saturdays to have regular group discussion, mock tests, training in general aptitude and so on.
- To prepare the students to be socially responsible citizens and to respond to the social needs of the society, the College has value education in its curriculum.

- Subjects like Bio-informatics and Plant Biology are offered to the students which have national and regional relevance.
- Green chemistry has been introduced by the Department of Chemistry to create **Environmental awareness**.
- Through the Placement cell, Personality Development and soft skill training are provided to all the UG and PG Students.

1.1.6 To what extent does the College use the guidelines of the regulatory bodies for developing or restructuring the curricula? Has the College been instrumental in leading any curricular reform which has created a national impact?

The college follows Semester pattern with Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) recommended by both **UGC and Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education.** Based on the common structure provided by the Curriculum Development Cell, the Departments design and develop curriculum through their Board of Studies and present it in the **Academic Council** for approval. During the curriculum design, the models of Thiruvalluvar University and national curriculum of **UGC** are referred.

The UG courses have a total credit of 140 allotted for 180 h. PG courses have the total credit of 90 allotted for 120 h.

- * Extra credit of 1 is given to the UG students undergoing internship training during the 4^{th} semester.
- * A Mini Project is introduced with an extra credit of 1 to UG Students during the 6th semester of their course.
- * Extra Credit, 1 is offered to UG students for completing mini project during their 6th semester of study.

1.2 ACADEMIC FLEXIBILITY

1.2.1 Give details on the following provisions with reference to academic flexibility

a. Core

- The College follows **single major system** in its UG programmes. The **major subjects are taught in all the three years**. During the first and second year, along with languages of Part I & II, the introductory subjects in their discipline are taught.
- Also during the same period, two Allied subjects are taught for which the students have choice in some major like chemistry and mathematics. The allied subjects are chosen keeping in mind, the inter connection of the subjects and the need to prepare students, for employment and higher studies.
- The theory papers of all courses are in Modular form having five modules (units). At present there is no scope for credit transfer and but there is provision for credit accumulations.
- Extra Credit of 1 (One) given to all final year UG Students for their participation in Extra-Curricular activities and Extension activities during the period of study of three years.

b. Elective Courses

To cater to the variety of interests of the students and to provide mobility within the Department, **each Department offers subject electives** in the 5th and 6th semesters. A student can take one subject elective out of two in the 5th semester and two subject electives out of three in the 6th semester. To enable inter Departmental mobility of the students, each Department offers job oriented and employability enhancing non-major elective courses in the second year. There are two non-major elective courses to be completed by all the students.

c. Enrichment courses

NIIT (Vishwa Computer Academy)

- Apart from the regular classes, compulsory certificate courses (SWIFT PROFESSIONAL) in computer skills are organized by the NIIT to all the first year students.
- To impart training module on SWIFT PROFESSIONAL and basic computer knowledge
- This course is made available to the students after the working hours i.e from 2 p.m to 5 p.m.

Soft Skill Programme

- To train the students in the field of English Language which will improve the language skills among the students.
- This soft skill programme ensure employability of the students.

Beautician Course

- **Women Development Cell** started beautician course on 14.07.2014 in collaboration with Angel Beauty Parlour and coaching centre.
- The course gives training in three modules.
- The classes are arranged in such a manner that for Aided students classes are conducted in the afternoon session from 2pm to 4 pm and for the unaided students the classes are arranged in the morning session from 10 am to 12 pm.
- After the completion of course the college issues valid certificate.
- Students have an option to apply for government certificate through **BHARAT SEVAK SAMAJ**, for which they have to appear for the exam.
- The duration for the beautician course undertaken by the students from 14.07.2014 to 10.09.2014 for the academic year 2014-2015. 47 students undergone training and successfully completed the course.
- For the Academic Year 2015-16, nearly 50 students have enrolled.

Admission Process for self-financing stream

Various measures have been taken to ensure that the admission process is transparent and that enough publicity is given on time to prospective candidates.

Undergraduate Programme

- An admission committee which consists of the Principal and management meet to discuss matters relating to the admission process, prospectus, the communications to be sent and displayed in notice boards, dates of interview and guidelines for admission.
- In the self-supporting stream (unaided) 50% of admission follows the state government's reservation policy and 50% is in open competition.
- Selected students for all courses appear for a personal interview with the respective Heads of Departments. The Principal finally approves the candidate after an interview.

Postgraduate Programme

All postgraduate courses fall under the self-financed stream (unaided).
 Similar procedure is followed for admission process as in the Unaided Stream.

M.PHIL Programme

- The Candidates with 55% and above at the P.G level are considered for admission. SC/ST candidates with 50% are eligible.
- The candidates are selected based on their qualifying examination marks, marks scored in the entrance test and interview, generally in the month of July, after the announcement of post graduate examination results.

Ph.D Research Programmes

• A Ph.D guide can supervise a maximum of 8 candidates at a given period of time.

- To undertake Doctoral level research the candidate must first approach the Guide under whom she wishes to work and ensure if there is a vacancy.
- The Selection of research candidates is on the basis of merit.
- All Departments conduct an entrance test which is followed by an interview. The Department Selection Committee comprises of an External Expert, the Head of the Department and the Research Guide.
- The selected candidates are admitted according to Thiruvalluvar University norms.
- Students who have cleared common eligibility tests conducted by state agencies such as SET and national agencies such as UGC-NET/UGC-CSIR/GATE are given preference for admission into Ph.D programmes.
- For all the academic programmes, each student after admission is given a unique registration number with an identity card to confirm her enrolment.

The **fee structure** for the Self-financing courses is fixed as per the norms of private colleges.

As there is demand for qualified **teaching faculty** in various institutions, the management is flexible to appoint the staff members who are in the process of pursuing/completing their required qualification.

The college provides **fairly good salary to the faculty members** of the self-financing courses.

1.2.5 Has the College adopted the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)? If yes, how many programmes are covered under the system?

Yes the programme adopted the Choice Based Credit System from the year 2009-2010. All programmes offered both under aided and self-financing stream are covered under the CBCS.

- The desire for higher studies is inculcated among the students through learning process.
- Value education is one of the mandatory subjects for the UG students, which inculcates integrity, values and aims to produce emotionally-balanced individuals.
- Environmental Science is a compulsory paper which makes each student aware of their ecosystem and their role and responsibility to protect the same.
- Through the Entrepreneurial Development Cell which is also a subject for B.Com students (Entrepreneurial development,) awareness is given on various schemes, new avenues and guidelines that act as an eye opener to generate income by becoming a successful entrepreneur.

Learning Outcome of PG Courses

- Students excel in their Subject Knowledge
- They are motivated to engage in research
- Instills confidence necessary for students to take up teaching profession.
- Project training and preparation of report help to improve their skill practically and motivate them to take up research in future.
- All PG Departments have introduced—Human Rights as a compulsory paper to enable the students to know various laws relating to basic human rights, children rights, women rights, dalit rights, and their benefits given to them under law, labour laws, Indian Constitution, amnesty international, UNESCO.
- Through the study circle the SET and NET coaching classes have created awareness among the PG Students who opt for teaching profession. This coaching is also helpful to avail JRF scholarships. It is also mandatory to PG students to attend the coaching classes.

1.3 CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

1.3.1 How often is the curriculum of the College reviewed for making it socially relevant and/or job oriented / knowledge intensive and meeting the emerging needs of students and other stakeholders?

- The curriculum of the College is revised completely atleast once in three
 years for making it socially relevant and job oriented and to meet the
 emerging needs of students.
- **Supplementary Boards of Studies** are convened when the need arises to modify the approved syllabi even within a year.

- Department of Computer Science, Biochemistry and Management studies conducted supplementary Board of studies in order to restructure and enrich the syllabus to suit the present scenario during 2012-13
- NIIT is providing basic computer course to the first year UG students as a
 value added course with the certificate of NIIT, is conducted after the college
 hours. This enables the students to update their basic computer knowledge
 in MS Office.
- Tally package to B.Com Students is also provided as an additional course to enable them to understand the practical preparation of the final statements by using the software.
- Coaching is provided to students to face various **competitive examinations** like, TNPSC, NET and SET. During 2013-14 a continuous coaching was organized by the Department of History in which 8 students cleared in the TNPSC Examination 2014.
- NET and SET coaching was organized by the college for two consecutive years (2011-12 and 2012-13) with UGC fund for the PG students and the success rate was 10%. It was achieved in the following years without fund through the NET/SET study circle.
- A certificate course on cosmetology was started in the year 2014-2015 as an additional course to the UG students which are aimed to provide knowledge about the use of cosmetics, hair dressing, eyebrow trimming and other health tips.
- Value Added certificate courses on Salesmanship, Accounting and Taxation, Medical Laboratory Techniques and E-Tourism are conducted to impart skills to our students.

Autonomy is empowerment to revamp, refashion and to explore new avenues in the field of higher education. Framing and designing a syllabus that is tailor made to cater to the needs of the students is an integral part of curriculum development under autonomy. Our faculty members take utmost care to provide the students with updated courses that ensures employability (self or otherwise).

1.3.3 What are the strategies adopted for revision of the existing programmes? What percentage of courses underwent a major syllabus revision?

- The curriculum for UG and PG is designed according to the **guidelines** framed by **Thiruvalluvar University and the UGC norms**. Autonomy enabled the updation of curriculum, to suit the need of the hour and also to face the competitive job market.
- The syllabus prescribed by the **parent university** is chosen for paper I and paper II of M.Phil. Paper III is the guide paper on the research topic and is designed as per the scholars research work by individual supervisors.
- Regular classroom learning along with emphasis on library usage, industrial/institutional visit, industrial training, seminars, workshops and conferences are carried out contributing to the overall intellectual development of students.
- The curriculum is revised based on the suggestions from different stakeholders like Students, Faculty Members, Alumni, Parents and Academic Experts from other Colleges, University Nominees and Industrial Representatives.
- The curriculum design suits the need of the day and also enables the students to acquire skills for employability.
- **100% of the courses underwent syllabus revision** during the period 2009-2015.

1.3.4 What are the value-added courses offered by the College and how does the College ensure that all students have access to them?

The following Value added courses were introduced

- Medical Laboratory Techniques by Zoology and Microbiology Departments.
- Water analysis by the Department of Chemistry.
- Salesmanship by Department of Commerce.

- E-Tourism by Department of History.
- Cosmetology by Women development cell. The above courses are offered to the interested students.

1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

- ❖ The Updating of curriculum and revision of syllabi are imperative for market relevance and meeting the challenges in life.

- ❖ Feedback is obtained **from the students** formally and informally.
- ❖ The College organizes periodic meetings with the Class leaders and association representatives under the guidance of the Principal.
- ❖ All Departments ask for a written feedback at the end of the VI semester from the final year students. Their comments are taken into consideration when the Board of Studies are convened.
- The suggestions emerging from these meetings are given due consideration during syllabus revision.

Yes. Only research programs are reviewed through online discussion. It had a very positive impact in the quality of research in the institution.

1.4.3 Specify the mechanism through which alumni, employers, industry experts and community give feedback on curriculum enrichment and the extent to which it is made use of.

- ❖ During the time of the **Alumni** meet, oral suggestions are obtained for the improvement of the curriculum.
- ❖ Alumni are included as BOS Members and their suggestions are given due importance for the updation of syllabus.
- ❖ During the parent teacher meeting in each semester, feedback is collected both orally and in written form which is utilized to make changes in the curriculum.
- ❖ The feedback from different sources are given due weightage by the Heads of the Departments for the modification of the syllabus. After the **Academic Audit 2007**, all courses have undergone syllabus revision between 2009 to 2015 for nearly 7 times.
- ❖ Industrialist are also included as a BOS member and their suggestions are given due weightage for the updation of syllabus.

1.4.4 What are the quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures undertaken by the institution in ensuring effective development of the curricula?

- Various subject specific workshops have been organized by the Departments of both aided and unaided stream which help in curriculum development.
- Various workshops were conducted for the staff members on the assessment, evaluation and development of curriculum.
- During September 2013 a workshop was organized for the staff members on the topic "Orientation and Retraining of Teachers" at Palamathy hills, in order to update the new teaching techniques and awareness on quality strategies for Institutional Development.
- During April 2012 and 2014 a workshops on "Need for examination reforms in autonomous colleges" were organized by COE on the methodologies in preparation of question papers and conducting the examination.

CRITERION II

TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

INTRODUCTION

- From its inception, the institution is always in the forefront **to create and promote holistic and integrated development in rural women** by imparting quality higher education for the past 43 years.
- The college is well known for its academic excellence and has a good reputation among public for serving women who are the **first generation learners and marginalized sections** from nearby districts.
- The college with a major thrust on empowerment of women has evolved sustainable good practices right from the admission process to that of teaching-learning and evaluation.

2.1 STUDENT ENROLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

- The quality of academic input attracts applicants for admission into the college from the creamy layer and also from the disadvantaged sections of the society.
- Students with good academic credentials as well as first generation learners with high aspirations find entry into the campus.
- Student enrolment procedures are in strict accordance with the norms of the state government for the aided stream.
- The college has more autonomy in the choice of candidates for the self-financed courses, which also follows state government norms.
- Various measures have been taken to ensure that the admission process is transparent and that enough publicity is given on time to prospective candidates.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the process of admission put in place for UG, PG and Ph.D. programmes by the College. Explain the criteria for admission (Ex. (i) merit, (ii) merit with entrance test, (iii) merit, entrance test and interview, (iv) common test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (v) others followed by the College?

PHASE I - Administrative Process

 An admission committee which consists of the Principal, two senior most staff members, the Heads of all Departments and a senior member from scheduled caste is constituted and they meet to discuss matters relating to the admission process, prospectus, the communications to be sent and displayed in notice boards, dates of interview and guidelines for admission.

PHASE -II -Publicity and Transparency

• The details of courses offered and the availability of application forms is announced in leading news papers prior to and immediately after +2 examination results are declared.

- The updation of the annual prospectus of the college is done in March. The prospectus that includes details about each Department, courses offered, infrastructural facilities, fee details, government quota details is issued along with the application form to the prospective students.
- The College offers courses in Arts, Science and Commerce at UG, PG, M.Phil and Ph.D levels.
- Applications are invited from the eligible students for all the courses. The applications are processed and the admission list is prepared.
- Transparency in the admission process is ensured.
- Admission is based purely on merit, strictly adhering to the State Government reservation policy.
- Merit lists are prepared based on +2 marks for various categories OC/BC/BCM/MBC/DNC/SC/SCA/ST/Sports Quota differently abled and daughters of Ex-Servicemen. Selected and Wait listed candidates are informed through post.
- The first list of provisionally selected students and waiting list is based on merit and as per the criteria given by the government. The admission list with quota-wise cut-off is prepared.
- To ensure objectivity and transparency, printed copies of the selection list and the waiting list of the candidates with the marks secured and the community they belong to indicating the cut-off and the quota is pasted on the notice boards for public viewing.

PHASE – III – Selection Process and Criteria Undergraduate Programme

- In the Aided stream students are selected for admission based on the marks scored at the +2 level. The cut off marks for the selection of candidates varies according to the community of the candidate and the courses selected.
- All seats are filled according to the Reservation policy of the State Government.
- In the self-supporting stream (unaided) 50% of admission follows the state government's reservation policy and 50% is in open competition.
- Selected students for all courses appear for a personal interview with the respective Heads of Departments. The Principal finally approves the candidate after an interview.
- On the date of admission all original documents are verified and the candidate is admitted after the payment of fees.
- Based on the number of vacancies after the First admission, subsequent provisional selection lists and waiting lists are prepared and admission is done.

Postgraduate Programme

All postgraduate courses fall under the self-financed stream (unaided).
 Similar procedure is followed for admission process as in the Unaided Stream.

M.PHIL Programme

- The Candidates with 55% and above at the P.G level are considered for admission. SC/ST candidates with 50% are eligible.
- The candidates are selected based on their qualifying examination marks, marks scored in the entrance test and interview, generally in the month of July, after the announcement of post graduate examination results.

Ph.D Research Programmes

- A Ph.D guide can supervise a maximum of 8 candidates at a given period of time.
- To undertake Doctoral level research the candidate must first approach the Guide under whom she wishes to work and ensure if there is a vacancy.
- The Selection of research candidates is on the basis of merit and reservation policy.
- All Departments conduct an entrance test which is followed by an interview. The Department Selection Committee comprises of an External Expert, the Head of the Department and the Research Guide.
- The selected candidates are admitted according to Thiruvalluvar University norms.
- Students who have cleared common eligibility tests conducted by state agencies such as SET and national agencies such as UGC-NET/UGC-CSIR/GATE are given preference for admission into Ph.D programmes.
- For all the academic programmes, each student after admission is given a unique registration number with an identity card to confirm her enrolment.

2.1.3 Does the College have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process? Yes.

- The college has an **Admission committee** (composition mentioned earlier) for reviewing admission process and student profiles manually.
- The college admission committee along with the **IGAC**, studies the admission process aided by inputs from parents (collected through structured questionnaire) and the public relations team. This data is vital as it helps to streamline the process for the next academic year.
- Parents meet the Heads of Departments along with the students during the time of admission.
- The students are provided with a copy of the rules and regulations of the college at the time of admission.
- If there are any complaints from the students, parents and public or from other sources during the process of admission, they are to be received by the Admission Committee and corrections are to be made in the admission process, which has never happened so far.

The admission policy of the college and the geographical location of the college in a rural area mainly comprising of students belonging to socially and

economically backward sections, ensure equal opportunity for all eligible candidates in admission.

2.1.4 What are the strategies adopted to increase / improve access to students belonging to the following categories

- a) **Students from SC/ST community**: 18% of seats are reserved for the SC including 3% for the Arunthathiyar Community, and 1% for ST Students. A rank list will be exclusively prepared for the SC, ST, BC, and MBC Students.
 - These students avail government scholarships and other benefits provided by the management.
- b) **Students from OBC Community**: 30% for BC (including 3.5% for BC Muslim) and 20% for MBC. These students also avail government scholarships and other benefits provided by the management.
- c) Differently abled: As per the State Government Policy, reservations and other facilities are provided to the physically and visually challenged students. The campus infrastructure has been modified wherever possible to aid mobility of these students. Ramps and lifts have been provided especially for the physically challenged students to have easy access to class rooms.
- d) Outstanding achievers in sports and extracurricular activities: The management recognizes the outstanding achievers in sports by giving cash awards during the college day as a token of recognition and tution fee concession during the period of their course. Outstanding achievers in extracurricular activities are recognized by giving proficiency certificate and cash awards during the college day by the management.

2.2 CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

2.2.1 Does the College organize orientation / induction programme for freshers? If yes, give details of the duration of programme, issues covered, experts involved and mechanism for using the feedback in subsequent years.

Orientation programme for the first years.

- Every year, after the admission process is completed, an orientation programme for the freshers is conducted for two days in their respective Departments. This is merged with the **bridge course** for 5 days which includes 3 days of fundamental English and 2 days of fundamentals in major and allied subjects. This enables an effective orientation to the freshers who enter into the new courses with ease. Campus visit is arranged to the freshers to become acquainted with various facilities in the college.
- On the first day of I year graduates, the principal welcomes the students in the open auditorium in the **prayer session**. The Principal briefs students about Infrastructure, Support Services, Extension and Outreach activities, Choice Based Credit System, Semester Pattern, Continuous Assessment, Scholarships available and so on.,
- She also emphasizes the importance of the 75% attendance mandatory for each paper within a course as well as value systems, discipline and punctuality.
- The Principal focuses on introducing students to various co-curricular and extension activities available on Campus–Sports, NCC, NSS, CCC, RRC, YRC, Rotract, Enviro Club and Entrepreneur Development Cell.

2.2.2 Does the College have a mechanism through which the "differential requirements of student population" are analysed after admission and before the commencement of classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?

- The **slow and advanced learners** are identified by their performance in the regular class tests conducted. At the end of the first assessment exam, academically weaker students are identified; their parents are called and briefed about their role.
- Apart from the regular classes, compulsory certificate courses (SWIFT PROFESSIONAL) in computer skills are organized by the NIIT to all the first year students.
- The **Tutor Ward Counselling system** of the college is meant to identify difficulties faced by the students in terms of learning, financial hiccups and emotional problems. During the monthly meeting, the teacher mentor, interacts with the student on one to one basis and discusses academic and personal issues with her. Apart from this, every class has a teacher in charge to monitor the day to day affairs, discipline and the holistic growth of the students. The attendance and performance in the classrooms are given more importance and suitable preventive action is taken whenever needed. Rank cards are also maintained by the tutor for the evaluation of the student performance.
- The **Differently abled students** are taken care of by providing them with Wheel Chairs to be used in the campus, and ramps. Student volunteers in the campus support them in a big way. The College takes every effort to get them the Government scholarships due to them.
- As per the UGC guidelines, every staff member takes remedial classes for slow learners. In these classes specific problems, tough topics and concepts are given more attention. The **slow learners** are encouraged and are provided with supporting materials, lecture materials and old question papers. Teachers provide personal guidance whenever such students approach them.
- Remedial coaching is organized by each Department for slow learners, differently abled students and SC/ST students after the regular college working hours. Their academic performance is evaluated through their continuous assessment exams and coaching is given in the specific subjects where their performance is very below the average level. The coaching classes are in a personalized manner to cater to the academic needs of the above students. Regular tests are also conducted during these coaching classes.
- Remedial coaching is also conducted for the students to complete their arrears after the completion of End Semester Exams. The students approach the concerned staff and the remedial coaching is given for the completion of their arrear subjects. As a note Department of Commerce helped Ms. R. Pavithra of B.C.A underwent the remedial coaching for completion of her arrear Allied Paper in Accountancy. Similarly Department of Chemistry helped Ms. P. Gayathri of Foods and Nutrition Department

underwent the remedial coaching for completion of her arrear Allied Paper in Chemistry. There are innumerable cases where the remedial coaching helped the students to complete the course successfully.

• Remedial Coaching records are maintained by the concerned Departments.

2.2.3 Does the College provide bridge /Remedial /add - on courses? If yes, how are they structured into the time table? Give details of the courses offered, department wise / faculty-wise?

Yes,

- A **bridge course** is arranged for the student freshers for five days. The first three days are organized by the English department to recall their English skills to apply at college levels. The next two days are followed by the concerned departments to orient the core subjects.
- Remedial coaching will commence after the completion of first Continuous assessment examination, the slow learners are identified and coaching classes are conducted by the staff members out of college hours.
- Add-on courses are introduced from the academic year 2015-16. The course is inclusive of on the job training and certificates are issued to the students after the completion of the course. The courses are conducted out of College hours and on Saturdays. The details of the courses are given below:

2.2.4 Has the College conducted a study on the incremental academic growth of different categories of students; - student from disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, physically handicapped and slow learners etc.? If yes, give details on how the study has helped the College to improve the performance of these students.

Ensuring consistency in the academic progress of all who enter the campus is a significant challenge and the college meets this demand effectively. The following are some of the in-built mechanisms which help in ensuring consistent academic progress:

• Comprehensive analysis of the examinations results: A Comprehensive analysis of the examinations results is carried out by the Controller of Examinations and presented to the **Result passing board** every year. The

- steady increase in pass percentage, observed from the first year to the third year, reveals that the desired outcome of academic progress is realized.
- The provision of **Remedial Coaching** by identifying the under achievers and slow learners is an endeavor in this regard.
- Instant Supplementary Examinations in June help the slow performers to clear their arrears and get the degree within the stipulated time of study.
- Parent-Teacher Meetings are conducted at least once in a year for presenting the report cards to the parents, the progress of the wards are explained and motivated.
- A healthy rapport is built between the parents and the teachers to jointly
 monitor the academic progress of the students. Parents are informed about
 the academic performance of students through parent-teacher meetings in
 each semester. A copy of the mark statement with appropriate verbal
 remarks is also sent to the parents. Parents are encouraged to approach the
 Department for clarifications at any time.
- The Office of the Controller of Examinations along with the HOD's of various Departments study the incremental academic growth of different categories of students (students from disadvantaged sections of society, SC\ST students, economically disadvantaged, physically handicapped and slow learners.) separately. The results are analyzed batch-wise and these are shared with the concerned Departments staff to initiate necessary action to improve the academic performance of a given category of students.

- From the above table it is clear that the students show a better performance in their 3 years period for UG Students and 2 years period students in their academic performance.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to the learning needs of advanced learners?

Special Coaching is given to **Advanced Learners** to score higher marks in their academic papers. They are also encouraged to participate in Competitions, Paper Presentations, Poster Presentations and Publications. As a note **Lakshmi Priya I M.A English** was awarded best presentation for the paper on debunking canons on historiographic metafiction on 21.03.2015 at A.V.V Pushpam College, Poondi. She has presented many papers in different conferences for which the staff in the department guided her and financial assistance is provided by the management.

2.2.6 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- The college follows the government policies with regard to the admission of differently abled students in the aided stream.
- The College has more autonomy to **admit differently abled students** in adherence to government policies in the unaided stream.
- The College has implemented a special scheme for the differently abled students, the details are as below
 - ✓ The management of the DKM college for women, Vellore has constituted a
 committee with the Principal, Senior staff member and Student
 representatives as members to recommend fee concession and other
 facilities to socially deprived students who are eager to pursue higher
 education in the college.
 - ✓ Girl students falling under the categories of **visually impaired**, **physically challenged**, **polio-affected**, **transgender**, **war widows and destitute** will be supported for pursuing higher education in the college so that they will be empowered to lead a life with confidence. The extent of assistance required for each applicant will be decided after carefully scrutinizing the merit and need of such students/guardians. The age limit will be as per government norms.

2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

2.3.1 How does the College plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print, etc.)

The visionary character of the college is rendered obvious in the manner in which it plans and organizes the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules well in advance.

Academic Calendar

- The College Calendar is prepared every year by the Committee in -charge in consultation with the **Heads of Departments**, **Principal and administrative officers** of the college. 90 Working days are planned for each semester. The Calendar is printed during the summer vacation and all the students receive a copy of the same when the new academic year starts in June.
- The **IQAC Calendar** is in force from the year 2013-14, is prepared by the committee to record the proposed dates for conducting meetings by the various NAAC committees for planning and execution of the various activities during the academic year. A record of such meetings are maintained by the committees co-ordinators and minutes are recorded.
- The Principal in consultation with the Controller of Examination decides on the dates for the conduct of the two internal tests for each semester, Semester Examinations the issue of examination forms and all such details are incorporated to in the **Academic Calendar**. This helps teachers incharge of various subjects to plan dates for assignments, class quizzes and seminars.

• As the date of the internal and external tests and examinations are provided in the calendar, students can also plan for their academic and extracurricular/personal tasks accordingly.

Planning and Effective Implementation

- At the beginning of each semester, all teachers prepare a **Lesson plan** of the entire semester, for every course they handle and it is submitted to the Head of the Department.
- The Lesson plan includes the content to be taught during the specific period of time with the precise details of the **teaching methodology**.
- The Heads of the Department periodically check the completion of the individual lesson plan of the respective faculty members.
- **Student's feedback** collected at the end of every year is also considered while making the lesson plan and during its implementation for subsequent action.
- As per the guidelines of the Thiruvalluvar University, various examination reforms were introduced.
 - ➤ Question paper setting is done by 80% external examiners and 20% internal examiners.
 - > Central valuation is followed
 - > External Chief Superintendent is appointed to observe the way of conduct of Semester Examinations.
 - > Dummy numbers are given to the answer scripts before evaluations.
 - > The conduct of instant examination is conducted for final year last semester exam for both UG and PG students provided they have only one paper as arrear in the last semester (Current semester).
 - > The passport size photographs of the candidates appearing the exam are printed in the respective mark statements. The mark statements have holograms.
 - For UG candidate 80% internal and 20% external evaluations and for PG and Research candidates 100% external evaluations are carried out.

- The subjects are allotted to the staff members for the forthcoming academic year and the timetable is prepared accordingly.
- With the above process, the department members are well informed of their course outline and schedule which helps for preparation of the teaching programmes and methodologies for effective teaching.

2.3.3 What are the courses, which predominantly follow the lecture method? Apart from classroom interactions, what are the other methods of learning experiences provided to students?

- **Group Activities** in Participatory learning include peer teaching, Tutorials, Group discussion, Model making, Organizing exhibitions, participating in Academic competitions, interactive public lectures by eminent resource persons, Brainstorming, Role play, Field survey/Field work, on the spot study, Corporative Learning and Academic Debates.
- The **Language-Departments** specially organize Quiz, Debates and poetry competitions.
- The **Academic clubs** of the Departments organize activities to facilitate creative academic pursuits of the students individually and collectively. The

Intercollegiate and Inter-Departmental academic programmes encourage the same in addition to bringing a competitive edge to the academic endeavor of the students.

- Internet is used by the students and staff to get additional information from the college library.
- Smart class rooms are utilized for innovative Teaching and Learning process in order to provide Audio-Visual learning process through power point presentation for the sensitive topics related to the curriculum.
- **Experiential Learning** is practiced to students through Industial Visits, Internship Training and Mini Projects.

2.3.4 How is 'learning' made more student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty that contribute to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management.

Three types of learning methodology are followed. They are:

- Interactive and Lecture based learning.
- Practical oriented and Project-based learning through mini projects.
- Computer-assisted learning for the required courses.
- Experiments are carried out more than required if necessary for the benefit of the students.
- All the laboratories have sufficient facilities with equipments required.
- For the experiments, detailed lab instruction manuals are provided. The observations are checked and verified by the faculty and record books are maintained systematically.
- Internship training is included in the curriculum for second year UG students with extra credit.
- The effective teaching learning process is enabled with the assistance of computers and printers.
- Our college is having LCD projectors, OHPs and SMART class room facilities adequately.
- Every semester, invited Lectures by eminent people from Industry, Academic and Research Institutions are arranged by concern departments. Workshops, Seminars and Symposia are organized by all the departments every year.

2.3.5 What is the College policy on inviting experts / people of eminence to provide lectures / seminars for students?

- The college encourages the departments to organize seminars / workshops / conferences every year.
- Atleast two programmes are organized by each department, aided courses
 utilize the UGC funds to conduct the seminars/workshops/conferences.
 The management is generous to provided funds to the unaided courses
 for conducting the programmes.
- The departments have the autonomy to invite experts from both national and international level suiting the need of the programme.
- During the period 2009-2015, 67 national level/workshops and 2 Intertational level/workshop was conducted by the departments (ANNEXURE I).
- 47 guest lecture meetings were conducted during the period 2009-2015 (ANNEXURE II).

2.3.6 What are the latest technologies and facilities used by the faculty for effective teaching? Ex: Virtual laboratories, e-learning, open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

- The faculty members in the institution use both aids like blackboard/ white board and electronic teaching aids to ensure effective learning experience for students.
- Faculty members use e-learning resources, working models, course materials for effective teaching.
- The institution is equipped with LCD projectors and all the faculty members and students have access to Wi-Fi broadband internet.
- The institution has a sizable collection of eBooks and multimedia content such as encyclopedias and video lecture series.
- Students have access to internet, a number of magazines and news papers through which they can gather vast amount of information and effectively update themselves with current knowledge.

2.3.7 Is there a provision for the services of counsellors / mentors/advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-socio guidance? If yes, give details of the process and the number of students who have benefitted.

- Each department of the college organizes a Tutor-ward team where faculty members are the team members.
- Every class is under the supervision of two tutors.
- Each tutor takes care of 30-35 numbers of students in a class. Counseling session is conducted, last Friday of every month.
- The tutors will submit their report to the Head of the Department.
- A student counselor is appointed by the college to counsel the needy students to overcome examination fear and also give guidance psycho-socio problems.

2.3.8 Are there any innovative teaching approaches/methods/practices adopted /put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve the learning? What methods were used to evaluate the impact of such practices? What are the efforts made by the institution in giving the faculty due recognition for innovation in teaching?

The college is well aware of the rapid changes in the field of higher education and research, and the college has been taking efforts to keep pace with the innovative teaching-learning practices. The following are a few of the measures adopted:

- Promotion of student-centric learning through interactive classes, role play, assignments, projects, seminars and practical sessions.
- The faculty members effectively utilize the Wi-Fi internet facility for data collection, preparation of notes and for enhancing the student participation in learning.
- The students are trained and motivated to make seminar presentations with the help of ICT.
- Online availability of e-journals in the library.
- SMART class rooms, OHPs, LCDs, videos etc. are used for teaching purpose.
- Research and Development is promoted, encouraged and efforts are made to obtain Sponsored Research Consultancy Projects.

- The faculty members guide the students to undertake research projects by,
 - o Providing them innovative ideas,
 - o Framing questionnaires,
 - o Collecting and analyzing data,
 - o Report preparation.

2.3.11 What efforts are made to facilitate the faculty in learning / handling computer-aided teaching/ learning materials? What are the facilities available in the College for such efforts?

- The Faculty members have been trained to use computer, internet technology as well as **e-learning techniques** through various training programmes and workshops. Department of commerce organized a special workshop on **SPSS package** to train the faculty and the Research Scholars to get practical knowledge and for their further research.
- Smart class rooms are equipped with laptop and LCD Projectors which are
 utilized by the staff members to impart technology based teaching to the
 students.
- The library is equipped with a separate internet browsing facility for staff
 and students. E-Journals are made available to them through UGC Inflibnet
 scheme. Each Department is provided with computers with printers. This
 type of training and facilities motivate the staff members to use more
 computer-aided teaching-learning methods.
- The Language and English teachers have been provided with a separate laboratory to ensure **proficiency in the spoken skills** of students. The faculty members of the English Department are trained to use resources available in the Language Laboratory.

2.3.12 Does the College have a mechanism for evaluation of teachers by the students / alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation used in achieving qualitative improvement in the teaching-learning process?

- Evaluation of teachers by students with the help of a **structured questionnaire** has been in practice.
- A Questionnaire having five different components dealing with teaching learning methodology and the performance and professional conduct of the teachers inside classrooms and within the campus, are given to the students and they are asked to give their response. Feedback is given to the faculty with necessary instructions by the Principal for further improvement.

• The Principal meets the staff members individually to discuss the students' evaluation. Results of this evaluation and the subsequent discussion with the Principal and Department Heads help to improve the quality of teaching and evaluation.

The institution does not face any challenge in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame as it is not hindered either by students are any other outside forces.

2.3.13 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If yes elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

- The faculties prepare **lesson plan** for each subject and follow it strictly. This is also periodically monitored by HODs concerned.
- The college has the practice of covering the syllabi well in advance and fulfilling the requirements of internal assessments on time.
- Loss of working days due to any reason is compensated by additional classes on Saturdays or through extra hours.
- A **Log book** is maintained by each faculty member. A complete record of daily plan, weekly plan, monthly plan is recorded in the log books and is monitored by the department HODs.
- The Internal assessment marks are also recorded in the Log book.

2.3.14 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- Funds for buying new books for every Department are set aside every year. The team of teaching staff along with the HOD makes the choice of new books based on their need and the available funds. New books bought for the library are displayed in the shelves meant for them. The lending of new books takes place after few days. UG students is allowed to draw Two books, PG Five books and research scholars Five books at a time. The library follows the cataloguing system by title, author, numbers which helps the easy retrieval of books.
- **Barcode system** is in use for easy accessibility for lending the books from the library.
- New arrivals Stand is available in the library for the display of new arrivals
 of books.
- The library manages to cater to the needs of teachers and students with access to books and journals.
- The **Book bank system** provides Text books which are kept as reserve for the underprivileged students and are issued for one semester.
- Books for Competitive Examinations are issued to the students under the **Special Issue Scheme**.
- The Librarian helps the Departments to purchase the latest edition of the books as per the requirements of the teachers.
- Provision for ordering books online is also given.

• Book exhibitions on campus facilitate Faculty members to select the books of their choice which is needed for teaching.

2.3.15 How does the institution continuously monitor, evaluate and report on the quality of teaching, teaching methods used, classroom environments and the effect on student performance.

The College continuously monitors and evaluates the various factors that are related to the **quality of teaching-learning** process.

- The regularity of classes, the take home assignments and their timely submission, revision of the previous day's lesson on the next day, frequent class tests, internal assessments helps in continuously monitoring the quality of Teaching-learning.
- The Principal also visits the Departments and meets the HOD, staff and students and interacts with them on these areas.
- Two continuous assessment tests and one model examination are conducted for each course both UG and PG and the students performance are evaluated regularly.
- **Tutor-ward system** helps to monitor the academic performance of the students and through this system the slow learners are counseled for better performance in their forthcoming examinations.
- Preparation of **Log books** by the teaching faculties is another record to monitor the teaching and learning process.
- Feedback is also received from the final year students regarding the teaching performance, infrastructure, and other facilities provided by the college and the suggestions of the students are considered for further revision of the teaching methodologies.

• The Aided Stream has to abide by the **Community Roster system** provided by the Employment Exchange. Advertisements are also given in the

- newspapers after obtaining the necessary permission from the Directorate of Collegiate Education.
- The Candidates are shortlisted based on the guidelines for selection; giving priority to merit, the selection is made out of the shortlisted candidates after assessing their performance in the written test, demo classes and the interview by the selection committee including Government nominee, University nominee and a member from Scheduled caste.
- The **Selection Board** comprising the Principal, a member from the Trust Board, a University representative, two subject experts nominated by university and the Head of the Department concerned conducts the interview and select the candidate.
- For Self-Supporting staff members, applications are invited from interested candidates and the selection procedure is the same as that of the Aided Stream with the same members on the Selection Board. Merit is the only criteria used while short-listing candidates for the interview.

2.4.13 What are the teaching innovations made during the last five years? How are innovations rewarded?

- Faculty members have been encouraged to use alternative pedagogical aids like OHPs, LCDs, and other audio-visual aids and to not rely solely on the blackboard.
- Teaching methodologies such as case study, role play, group discussion, seminar, reading and writing assignments and quiz are practiced by the faculty to promote active student participation.
- Students from the English Department are made to **view movies** based on classics and are encouraged to take part in active discussions and create reports on the same.
- It is mandatory for all the PG departments to invite **Subject Experts** for special lectures based on their current syllabus. **Special Lectures** are extend to UG courses who are interested and necessary expenditures are met by the management.
- The College has appointed **Student Counselor** who takes care of psychological issues prevalent in students. The counselor gives group counseling in the class especially during examination times to motivate and eradicate examination fear. The **Psychologist** also render service through individual counseling for the needy students who are referred by the faculty members, parents and for the students who voluntarily require such counseling.
- During Special Meetings conducted to evaluate teaching methodologies adopted by the faculty members, teachers who have used innovative teaching methods in the classroom are recognized by the Heads of the Departments and other staff members are encouraged to follow the same, Innovations in teaching methodologies are discussed in detail for implementation in other classes as well. This is also mentioned in staff meetings by the Principal and the concerned staff members are commended.
- Use of **ICT** widely for teaching is encouraged by providing training to the faculty members by external experts.
- The teaching methodology is transferred from traditional methods to modern techniques and appreciated by the management.

2.4.14 Does the College have a mechanism to encourage

- Yes, Mobility of faculty between institutions for teaching is encouraged.

2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS REFORMS

2.5.1 How does the College ensure that all the stakeholders are aware of the evaluation processes that are operative?

- The college website **www.dkmcollege.org** uploads the results for prompt accessibility of the students.
- The College provides all the required information about the evaluation methods in advance through the **Hand Book**.
- Every year, after the admission process is completed, an orientation programme for the fresher's is conducted for two days in their respective Departments.
- On the first day of first year graduates, the principal welcomes the students in the open auditorium along with the prayer session
- Every Year, the students are given an orientation by the Department heads about the examinations system at the beginning of the year.
- The newly recruited staff members are also given an introduction to the examination system. Each Department separately gives orientation to newly admitted students about CBCS, Continuous Assessment and Semester

Examinations, question paper, re-totaling, re-evaluation option and rules regarding their conduct of class tests and examinations.

- Previous question papers are made available to the students from each Department and are available in the College library.
- The College conducts **special orientation programmes** on issues related to examinations.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms initiated by the College and to what extent have they been implemented in the College? Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the evaluation management system?

Examination Reforms

- The institution has initiated major reforms in the field of examinations.
 Abiding by the directives given by the State Council for Higher Education of Tamil Nadu, the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) has been introduced in the year 2008-09.
- The College has adopted a **uniform question paper pattern** for all disciplines. Single Valuation system has been introduced.
- Photocopies of answer scripts are available to students for retotaling and revaluation on payment of prescribed fees.
- A Moderation of two marks is added as and when required for a pass for each paper. Question papers setting and valuation are done both internally and externally.
- The College follows a 25:75 ratio for continuous Assessment and semester Examinations.
- The College calendar contains dates for Continuous Assessment and Semester examinations and they are strictly adhered to.
- The results are announced through the **College Website** and the notice boards roughly four weeks after the examinations.
- Copies of results are sent to the Heads of the Department for follow-up.
 Major part of the examination process is computerized, and declaration of results is made online.
- The answer booklets are printed with **Barcode Technology** to maintain transparency in valuation process.
- Five marks is allotted for Assignment (2 marks), Seminar (2 marks), Project (1 mark) to inculcate experiential learning.

Regular tests are conducted at the Department level. As per the University norms, internal assessment tests are conducted in every subject, and the students are given internal assessment marks based on their performance in the tests, assignments, seminars attendance and overall performance of the students in the class room. The Term Practical and Theory exams are conducted at the end of the semester.

2.5.3 What measures have been taken by the institution for continuous evaluation of students and ensuring their progress and improved performance?

- The college conducts two **Internal Continuous Assessment tests** and one Model Exam, from which best two out of Three exams is taken for calculating internal marks allotted for 20 out of 25.
- Class Room performance is evaluated through on time submission of **Assignments** for which 2 marks are allotted out of 25.
- Class room performance is also evaluated by the students' performance in Class Room **Seminars** for which 1 mark is allotted out of 25 marks.
- Students are also encouraged to present a **Project report** on the topic related to the syllabi for which 2 marks are allotted out of 25.
- **Semester examinations** are conducted externally and the papers are valued through Central Valuation process. External Examiners are invited for the Central valuation.
- PG Evaluation is done through 100% external valuation.
- M Phil is also is done through 100% external valuation.
- Viva Voce for the PG and M Phil Dissertations are done by the External Examiners.
- The results are analysed and required measures are taken to improve the academic performance of the students by conducting **Remedial coaching**.
- Academic achievers are recognized by giving **Cash award** to the outgoing students in the **college day**.
- Students are also given cash awards on the **Teachers Day** for their performance in the previous year subject wise.
- Best performing students are given cash awards on **the convocation day** for their successful completion of their degree.

2.5.4 What percentage of marks is earmarked for continuous internal assessment? Indicate the mechanisms strategized to ensure rigour of the internal assessment process?

- Out of 100 marks **25**% of marks are earmarked for continuous internal assessment.
- **Centralized pattern of examinations** are conducted for the internal assessment Exams.
- Individual Mark Registers are maintained by the Departments.
- Rank Cards are issued to the students after the completion of the internal assessment Exams to be authenticated by the parents.
- **Parent -Teacher Meeting** is conducted once in a year and they are informed about their wards performance.

2.5.5 Does the College adhere to the declared examination schedules? If not, what measures have been taken to address the delay?

Yes, College adheres to the declared examination schedules.

- The average time taken by the College for declaration of examination results is **one month** after the completion of the Examinations.
- The college adopts **Website** of the college to publish the results.
- The college also gives hard copy of the **Results Galley** to the concerned departments for final Verification of the students.

2.5.7 Does the college have an integrated examination platform for the following processes?

- * Pre-examination processes Time table generation, OMR, student list generation, invigilators, squads, attendance sheet, online payment gateway, etc.
- * Examination process Examination material management, logistics.
- * Post examination process attendance capture, OMR based exam result, auto processing, generic result processing and certification.
- The College follows an integrated examination platform through **pre examination process** of timetable generation, student list generation, invigilation and attendance sheet and no dues attached to payment of fees in the College office.
- Under the examination process, examination material Management, logistics and conducting of examination is managed by the Controller of examination and a team of support staff.
- Under **post examination process**, the student attendance in the examination hall, paper corrections, submission of marks to the Controller of Exams, processing and declaration of results are carried out.
- No major changes have been effected in the Ph.D. Programme, since it comes under the purview of the parent University.

2.5.8 Has the College introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

No, the college follows Thiruvalluvar University norms.

2.5.9 What efforts are made by the College to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved process and functioning of the examination division/section?

Streamlining of the Operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations

- The Controller's Office is well equipped with adequate number of personnel who are trustworthy and dedicated.
- The Staff of COE office know to operate the computer and they are with IT knowledge.
- They follow a meticulous timetable that is prepared well ahead of time, keeping the main events of the College in mind.

• The Controller communicates with the Principal and the HODs and displays important information to the staff and students in the notice board.

2.5.10 what is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation?

- The internal assessment marks of the students are announced by each Department before they are submitted to the office of the Controller of Examinations.
- If the Students have any doubts, they will approach the Department heads, or the Principal if necessary.
- If the student is not satisfied with the marks obtained in the semester examinations she has the option of applying for revaluation with or without obtaining photocopy of the answer script.

2.6 STUDENT PERFORMANCE AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

Learning Outcome of UG Courses

- The Teaching-Learning Process is designed in such a manner that helps all our students to build an ethical character with social responsibility leading to full human being after the completion of their course.

- Soft skill training helps to improve communication skills which promotes self confidence
- Subjects especially skill based subjects are designed to bring about an overall development of the students to succeed the job market.
- The desire for higher studies is inculcated among the students through learning process.
- Value education is one of the mandatory subjects for the UG students, which inculcates integrity, values and aims to produce emotionally-balanced individuals.
- Environmental Science is a compulsory paper which makes each student aware of their ecosystem and their role and responsibility to protect the same.
- Through the Entrepreneurial Development Cell which is also a subject for B.Com students (Entrepreneurial development,) awareness is given on various schemes, new avenues and guidelines that act as an eye opener to generate income by becoming a successful entrepreneur.

Learning Outcome of PG Courses

- Students excel in their Subject Knowledge
- They are motivated to engage in research
- Instils the confidence necessary for students to take up teaching profession.
- Project training and preparation of report help to improve their skill practically and motivate them to take up research in future.

- All PG Departments have introduced—Human Rights as a compulsory paper to enable the students to know various laws relating to basic human rights, children rights, women rights, dalit rights, and their benefits given to them under law, labour laws, Indian Constitution, amnesty international, UNESCO.
- Through the study circle the SET and NET coaching classes have created awareness among the PG Students who opt for teaching profession. This coaching is also helpful to avail JRF scholarships. It is also mandatory to PG students to attend the coaching classes.

2.6.2 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

- The teaching learning and assignment strategies that are followed by the institution are structured in a uniform method.
- To compulsorily conduct the classes for the stipulated number of days by compensating for any intended / unintended holidays.
- Periodic reviews and feedback to keep track of the course of achievement of learning outcomes.
- Identifying deviations, if any, and to take corrective action on individual as
 well as on course basis. Materials are prepared for each learning outcome
 and given to students. Evaluation through test ensures that the outcomes
 are fully achieved.
- Also, the Institute is committed in creating an environment where students are supported to achieve their potential and working towards creating an inclusive learning community. This strategy recognizes the need to develop progressively self directed and confident learners with knowledge, skills, attitudes and values. It acknowledges that the students learn most effectively if they are supported as individuals to achieve personal development and self employability.

INTRODUCTION

D.K.M College in its journey of academic excellence opens up avenues for the **smooth implementation of research**. The institution promotes and monitors the creation of new knowledge in an ethical and evidence based research environment which is disseminated through publication and research to meet the emerging social and industrial needs.

3.1 PROMOTION OF RESEARCH

3.1.1 Does the college have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If yes, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations which have been implemented and their impact.

- The college promotes research by constituting a **Research Committee** headed by the Principal and a Coordinator and consists of members who have completed their Ph.D.
- The Committee takes pivotal role in practicing research in a knowledge based one and encourages the researchers to take up research to find solutions to local problem as a first priority.
- The committee mainly motivates and insists all the faculty members to register for Ph.D., to publish papers in reputed scientific and social journals, books and to apply for major and minor projects.
- A good number of papers have been published in national and international journals by the faculty members. Similarly the number of Ph.D. holders among the faculty has increased from 5 in 2009 2010 to 25 in 2014–2015, 5 members have submitted their Ph.D. thesis and 15 members have registered for Ph.D.
- **Research projects** were approved by UGC and TNSCST during this period for which all necessary facilities were provided by the Management.
- The Chemistry Department started full time/Part time M. Phil and Ph.D. Research program in the year 2009. At present the following Departments such as Mathematics, Zoology, Commerce and History, were approved for the Ph.D. (both full time and Part-time) programme by Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore. Similarly, Microbiology and Economics Ph.D. (Part-time) were also started. All the Departments have recognized Supervisors. There are recognized supervisors in the Departments of Tamil and English to supervise scholars to Ph.D. degree.
- Our college has M.Phil. programme from 2009 onwards in the following Departments: Chemistry, Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Microbiology, Nutrition, Commerce, Computer Science, Management and English.
- A Research mindset has been infused into the M.Sc. students who are carrying out projects and M.Phil. students working on their dissertation. The formation of research groups in every Department has also given them added motivation.

- The college encourages the students to visit various research institutions to gain research knowledge.
 - ✓ Final year B.Sc. Chemistry students visit Cholaiyil, Chennai.
 - ✓ The research scholars of the Department of Chemistry visited research institutions and universities like Madras University, Chennai, Periyar University, SCSVMU University, Mahatma Gandhi University, Kotayam, Kerala, VIT University, Vellore, IISc, Bangalore, Sathyabama University, Chennai, CIPET Chennai and Formulated Polymers, Chennai.
 - ✓ M.Phil. and Ph.D. scholars of chemistry and commerce regularly visit other university libraries like Madras University, Chennai, VIT University, ICFAI libraries.
- The Management of the college stimulates faculty members to conduct International and National level conferences, seminars and workshops. Eminent scientists and experts in various disciplines are invited for special lectures in their specialized areas.
- The staff members are sanctioned a total of 15 days on duty per year for
 presenting papers in National and International seminars. The staff
 members and students presenting papers in international conferences are
 duly recognized by the Management and Head of the institution and the
 expenses are reimbursed.
- The college takes efforts to circulate brochures and call letters about new events organized by the Departments of our college and other institutions for participation and presentation.

3.1.2 What is the policy of the College to promote research culture in the College?

In order to promote research culture the College has a research committee to cater to the needs of researchers in the following ways,

- The committee coordinates and monitors the attendance of the research scholars.
- The committee emphasizes the need for regular documentation.
- It also plays a role in revising the fee structure for research degrees.
- The committee has recommended to allot a research room to address the needs of the research scholar, which has been provided.
- The committee encourages the staff to engage in research. They are allowed to make use of the available infrastructure facilities such as laboratory, library, internet and WI-FI facilities.
- Several **research projects** were approved by **UGC**, **MHRD and TNSCST** during this period for which all necessary facilities were provided by the Management.
- The institution (Management) encourages the students to undertake research activities. In the Aided stream, a group of III B.Com., students have taken up a project called "A Study on Brand Preference of Selected Cosmetics in Vellore town" under the supervision of Mrs.A. Sudarvizhi,

- Students of III B.Com and II B.Com are doing projects under the guidance of Mrs. K. Nappinai, Dr.R.Padmaja and Mrs. A.Sudarvizhi.
- Students of the unaided wing are doing projects in their final semester as part of the curriculum in various Departments viz., Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Commerce, Mathematics, Management studies, Microbiology and Foods & Nutrition.
- Summer research projects for the interested students has been started recently.

- ❖ Reputed researchers from different fields are invited as Resource Persons to Seminars, Workshops and Special Guest Lecture Meetings.
- ❖ The Departments also organize conferences where researchers interact with both students and faculty.
- ❖ There is a timely release of **UGC funds** for the conduct of Seminars, workshops, conferences as per the UGC Norms.
- ❖ **UGC Grants for the Major and Minor projects** are released on time, Audit and Submission of Utilization Certificates by the Principal investigator are done within the stipulated period.
- ❖ The College office maintains perfect documentation and facilitates smooth research activities.

3.1.5 How is interdisciplinary research promoted?

The **Biomaterials research group of Chemistry Department** gives consultancy for M.Sc. Chemistry and M.Tech. Projects in the area of preparation of Nano Biomaterials and treatment of effluent by Batch and Column absorption study.

- Departments have established linkages with various colleges, Associations and Research bodies to inspire the students to take up new fields of research.
- **Department of Chemistry** and **Department of Microbiology** are conducting combined research in biomedical sciences.
- **Department of Chemistry** has linkage with the Department of Biochemistry of **Vellore Institute of Technology (VIT)**, in connection with interdisciplinary research.
- **Water Analysis** is carried out by the Department of Chemistry for the samples of the college and the service is also extended to the general public.
- Furthermore, the Department of Chemistry also has the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Marine Bioprocess Research Center, Pukyong National University, Busan, Namgu, South Korea to have joint research activities.
- Department of Bio-chemistry and Department of Foods and Nutrition together formed an interdisciplinary society in the name of Inter Society of Bio-chemistry and Nutrition (ISBN) to conduct collaborative research works.
- The research scholars of the nearby colleges are encouraged to get **training** in the Laboratory Techniques.

 The Microbiology Lab is widely used by Scholars of various Departments of our College and also from the nearby colleges for Anti-Microbial studies of their samples.

- Guest lecture meetings are organized by all the research Departments on various current topics focusing on research.
- Special subject experts are invited by the PG Departments to facilitate easy understanding of innovative topics to take up further research.

3.1.9 Details on the College initiative in transferring/advocating the relative findings of research of the College and elsewhere to the students and the community (lab to land).

- Dr. P.N. Sudha, Principal (Department of Chemistry) through her research findings introduced **vermicomposting** in order to convert biodegradable waste into organic manure for organic farming. This organic manure is also marketed to the needy formers in nearby villages.
- Contamination of toxic chromium in poultry feed was investigated and it was
 made known to the public through TV programmes, news papers and
 magazines. This has reduced the use of chrome treated leather waste in
 poultry feed manufactures.
- Through **Biomaterials Research Lab**, water analysis is undertaken by the scholars of the Department of Chemistry, which is extended to the residence of the nearby Villages.
- Biomaterials Research Lab is providing the prepared biomaterials to industry Everest Biotech, Bangalore to **control water pollution**.
- Another industry namely Hi-Tech Air Power Pvt. Ltd, Hyderabad, Andrapradesh, is also receiving the eco-friendly samples which was prepared in our lab to **treat industrial effluent**.

- The Staff and students involved in research are allowed to use the existing laboratories, computer assistance and general and Department libraries.
- Separate laboratory for M.Phil. and Ph.D. research work has been provided.
- Well Equipped Chemistry, Zoology, Biotechnology, Microbiology, and Biochemistry labs are made available for doing research.
- The College also has a Biotechnology instrumentation Lab to cater to the needs of all Science research and Biomaterial Lab to facilitate research in Polymer Chemistry.
- The staff members are acting as reviewers for various Elsevier, Scopus, Taylor and Francis journals. The reviewers are provided with access to their

- respective website free of cost for thirty days. In this way free access to high impact factor journals are provided to the research groups.
- The College has the required infrastructural facility for research. All the research Departments are well equipped and the details of the equipments are enclosed in the **ANNEXURE VI**.

- Yes. The College has a network resource centre with 14 computers which helps the researchers to acquire latest knowledge.
- The library has e-resources facility for research and INFLIBNET subscription to access the e-resources for research purposes. The access is given to all staff members and research scholars. Each staff and scholars are given an ID for effective use of E-resources.
- Library facilities were given a boost by subscribing national and international journals to know about the latest travels in research and in academic disciplines.
- Nearly Six Thousand e-Journals and e- Books are available in the college library.
- 14 computers, 1 printer, 1 TV and CD's are available in the college to facilitate the research.

- Through Food Preservation Training, the Department of Foods and Nutrition generated the income of Rs. 10,528 during the year 2010, Rs. 14,121 during the year 2011 and Rs. 15,000/- in the year 2012.
- Trade Mela was conducted during the year 2009-10 and 2010-11 by the Department of Commerce and the income of about Rs. 2000/- and Rs. 3000/- was generated respectively.
- Around Rs. 1,20,000/- has been generated through cattle breeding, milk production, cultivating vegetable, greens using organic manure every year through Enviro club.

- The Mentor Ward System is used to monitor the progress of the students' academic and non- academic record. Due recognition is given to the active student in the morning assemblies. Marks has been provided to the students based on the merit of the extension activity and the same has been utilized to gives **SERVICE MEDAL** to the active students on the College day and also marks out of 50 with credit 1 is provided to the candidate.

3.6.7 How does the College ensure the involvement of the community in its outreach activities and contribute to the community development? Detail the initiatives of the College which have encouraged community participation in its activities.

The College makes our students to involve in various activities, through which it ensures the community development takes place. The College also initiates community participation in the college activities for the mutual benefits.

- The college has adequate infrastructure to enable a good Teaching- Learning environment. The Management takes necessary steps to provide the infrastructure facilities to promote a free educational system. The suggestions and feedback is obtained from the academicians, alumni, students, parents and staff members for any additional infrastructure and they are provided by the Management when necessary. The facilities were improved by renovating the E Block, and constructing A-additional block after the previous NAAC visit.
- There are 79 class rooms, 20 laboratories including computer labs, 2 smart classrooms, 1 computer centre (Aided) and English language lab to provide the necessary space to pursue academic activities.
- A well furnished library with E-resources is available for staff and students.
- OHP and LCD are available in many Departments for the presentations by the staff and students.
- Separate office rooms for aided and self- supporting streams are provided for efficient administrative function.
- The office of the COE functions in a fully air conditioned complex with sufficient number of computers and reprographic facilities for the effective and smooth conduct of examinations. It has a separate hall for exam related work and two rooms to store examination records and a separate room for storing the Answer scripts of the past 5 years.
- Two air conditioned conference halls in "C" block have an in-built capacity to seat 200 people and a large auditorium of capacity 500 which have stage, excellent sound system and adequate equipments such as LCD projection system which help to convene meetings and workshops.

- An Open air Theatre helps to stage events for a large audience.
- Separate rest rooms are provided for staff and students in each Block.

WI-FI FACILITY

- The college has Wi-Fi facility. The facility has been extended to all the 15 Departments, IQAC mini hall, Principal room, Computer labs and Library.
- Wi-Fi facilities extended to Ph.D scholars in the separate room at D Block ground floor for research accessibility.

To ensure the comfort of all the students, hostel is equipped with facilities like Newspaper/magazines, television, indoor games and so on.

- The hostel facilitates the stay of 200 students. At present the strength is 100. Modernized kitchen which ensures hygiene in the hostel.
- Two spacious study halls.
- Telephone facilities at each floor.
- A lobby to facilitate parents and guardian to meet the hostelites.
- The Hostel day creates an opportunity for personal interaction and improvement.
- The hostel is meant only for women students with a woman warden.

4.1.6 How does the College cope with the health related support services for its students, faculty and non-teaching staff on the campus and beyond?

The college takes special efforts to ensure the health and well-being of its students by conducting health checkup camps and blood grouping is also done at that time. These camps are under the auspicies of the NSS, Rotaract and YRC.

- The Departments take care of the students in case of illness during the college time by taking them to the campus nurse for first aid. On call doctor facility is available.
- Awareness programmes on various women issues with special reference to Breast Feeding and personal hygiene are conducted regularly by NSS, Rotract, YRC, and the Dept. of Biochemistry and Food and Nutrition.
- Free medical camps are regularly conducted for the students through extension activities.
- Eye check-up camps are organized in collaboration with hospitals like Christian Medical College and the Government Hospital, Adukkamparai.
- The Management also has a special concern for the health of its staff and teaching community.

- Special leave on medical grounds is given to all the staff. The government aided staff members are provided with health insurance card by the government of Tamilnadu for the specified treatments in the hospitals.
- Maternity leave with pay is guaranteed for all the staff.
- Student Counselors from external agencies are invited during a particular session of a year to counsel the students on their personal problems.
- Regular counselors are also arranged for personal and group counseling activity.
- The Apollo Medical center has provided medical cards to the staff members to enable purchase of medicine on discount rates.
- First Aid is also provided in the college if the students fall ill during sports by the Physical Directress.

4.1.7 What special facilities are made available on the campus to promote interest in sports and cultural events? Sports facilities

Physical Education is an integral part of our curriculum. All UG and PG students are trained in group events which are displayed on the sports day.

- Physical directress are appointed in the aided and self-supporting streams to promote the sports activities of the college.
- Necessary sports equipments are purchased as and when required.
- Separate coaches for special games are hired to train students throughout the year.
- Prizes and cash awards are given by the Management to students for outstanding performances in their respective events.
- Scholarships and fees reduction is also provided to zonal, state and national level players.
- Indoor sports facilities like Table tennis, Carrom, Chess, Badminton are available.
- Outdoor sports Facilities like Kho-Kho, Kabbadi, Volley ball, Throw ball, Football, Hockey and Cricket are provided.
- Fitness facilities like Tread mill, Fitness Cycle are available.
- A Fitness Center is made available to students and staff.

SPECIAL FACILITIES TO PROMOTE CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

- The conference halls namely Kaveri, Vaigai, Brahmaputra and IQAC mini hall provide facilities to perform cultural events for various programmes organized by the college.
- College day, Fine arts week, Rangoli fest, Pongal and Diwali celebrations are some of the occasions for students to showcase their talents and creativity.
- Students are given training by staff members in folk dance and drama.
- The Open air auditorium is available to conduct various cultural events.
- The Fine arts committee conducts various competitions like Cooking, Rangoli, Saree designing, Jewelery making, Wealth out of waste, Solo dance, Group dance, Solo Singing and Group Singing.
- A special guest is invited on the fine arts day and the winners are given prizes.
- Extra-curricular activities committees identify the students with potential who are sent for various competitions conducted by other colleges.
- The NSS and Youth Red Cross days are celebrated to expose the talents among the students.

• On Fresher's Day students exhibits their talents to welcome the fresher's like solo song, group dance and drama and on Farwell Day the college invites celebrities and HOD's of various Departments bless the outgoing students.

Sports - Infrastucture

- The college is having two play grounds of 93750 sq.ft.
- The play grounds are used for training the students for cricket, football, Kho-Kho, Kabadi, Throwball, Volley ball and Tennis.
- There is a table tennis court.
- Indoor games like chess, carom board are arranged for the students.

4.4 MAINTENANCE OF CAMPUS FACILITIES

- The Management through the Administrative office takes care of the maintenance of buildings, classrooms and laboratories
- The regular cleaning work is monitored by the Enviro-club consisting of faculty members, student and women self-help group.
- Lab technicians in various laboratories take care of the maintenance of instruments
- A reverse osmosis plant is available in the campus to ensure safe drinking water
- White washing is done at regular intervals.
- A flower garden, herbal garden and a fountain in front of the A'block enrich the ambience of the college.
- Lawns, trees and plants make the college greener.
- Azolla cultivation is now practiced in the campus for feeding the cows and also used as organic manure.
- The college is neatly and cleanly maintained by the Self-help group. They are also maintaining the restrooms hygienically by cleaning toilets twice a day.

OTHER FACILITIES

- The college has a Canteen to cater to the needs of the staff and students. The food provided is hygienic and well monitored by the staff of the Department of foods and nutrition.
- The college provides the necessary stationery items like Pen, Paper, Notebooks, Charts, Pencils, Erasers and other related items for meeting the class room needs through student cooperative stores.
- The canteen has sufficient space for dining for staff and students.
- A cow shed with fourteen cows are maintained by the Self- help group providing milk to the canteen and hostel. The cows are fed with organic feed. Hence the milk is safe.
- The college website provides up to date information about the college activities. The web committee is responsible for updating the website to provide required information to the internal and external stakeholders of the college.
- The college has a democratically elected student union who actively participate in organizing various Department and college activities.
- The college has a special van for the usage of the staff and students in case of any emergency or to attend any special meetings.
- Separate Drinking Water let outs are provided for the students.

• Thirteen college buses cater to the transport needs of students from various parts of the city and one van to meet emergency needs, if any.


STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

5.1 STUDENTS MENTORING AND SUPPORT

5.1.1 Does the College have an independent system for student support and mentoring? If yes, what are its structural and functional characteristics?

Yes, The Institution aims to reach the goals of higher education and hence has established an effective means to achieve it by providing active students support and mentoring at different levels. The system works as mentioned below:

- **The Principal** monitors the students' needs and their progress through periodical meetings with the faculty members and student representatives. Principals room is always open to meet the staff and students who require the assistance for any grievances.
- **The HOD** and Faculty members counsel the students periodically.
- The Course teacher is easily approachable by the students for their academic requirements.
- The entire student body is divided into small groups of 25-35 students (in UG) and 10-20 students (in PG) who is mentored by a faculty member named as **Tutor**. The tutor pays close attention to all their needs. The Tutor is easily approachable to the students for their academic requirements and all round progress.
- A **personal record** is maintained in the Department in which all personal and academic details of the student with the photograph are recorded for identification of the strengths and weaknesses of the students and to take suitable remedial and supporting measures when needed.



5.1.2 What provisions exist for academic mentoring apart from class room work?

 Regular assessment tests are conducted to identify the students who are high scorers, average and slow learners. The identified slow learners are given extra coaching other than regular class work in order to improve

- their performance for the forthcoming semester examinations. Besides, guidance is also provided to improve their skills all over.
- A Professionally qualified **Student Counsellor** appointed by the Management helps the students who need special attention. Regular counseling is conducted in groups in class rooms in various topics like human ethics, family relationship, skills related to job and any other current general topic. As the students need a let out and guidance to their personal problem, the counselor is available for individual counseling and we feel proud that our students are well protected and addressed when they need emotional support.

5.1.3 Does the College provide personal enhancement and development schemes for students? If yes, describe techniques employed e.g., career counselling, soft skill development, etc.

Yes, the following techniques are provided for the personal enhancement and development of students.

- At the entry level in the semester a one week **bridge course** is conducted to revive what the students have learnt in their school and orient them to the college atmosphere.
- **Value education** is a part of the curriculum to impart moral values and ethics that add on to the emotional quotient.
- **Environmental studies** are also a part of the curriculum to enable the students to understand and preserve nature and teach them a lifestyle that has minimum disturbance for nature.
- **Skill based papers** help the students to acquire extra knowledge and skills ensuring overall development (help to get jobs as per the needs from time to time)
- Non-major papers impart basic minimum knowledge in the fields new to the students.
- **Soft skill courses** help the students to improve their communication skills and build up their confidence levels.
- **Soft Skill** forms the part of curriculum. Soft Skill course is conducted to all the final year UG students. The students are trained in personality development, communicative skill, interview skills and to strengthen on vocabulary.
- **Career counseling** is given by faculty members in their respective fields. Career counseling programmes are conducted by the Placement Cell to make the students aware of the job opportunities in various fields and improve their job prospects.
- Awareness Programmes on IAS and IPS training, CA courses, Integrated P.hD programmes, NET, SET, GATE and different government examinations are provided to the students.
- Soft Skill Course is conducted for Six hours to all the final year UG Students. The students are trained in personality development, interview skills and communication skills.
- **Personality development programmes** are organized for all the final year students by the Placement Cell to prepare them to face interviews.
- The college admits the fact that the student should be employable when they
 pass out from our college. Hence various awareness programmes on the
 new courses, conduct of job oriented courses like compulsory computer
 course, Tally, Sales tax practicing, E-Commerce, Beautician course, Water
 treatment and analysis course, , Mushroom cultivation, Jewellery making

In the aided stream, 30% BC, 20% MBC, 18% SC, and 1% ST of the sanctioned strength of each course are reserved for the students. In unaided stream, this reservation is followed for 50 percent of the sanctioned strength.

- Scholarships are provided.
- Remedial classes are conducted for the academically weak students.
- Hostel facilities are provided.
- Transport facilities are given.
- Free NET/SET coaching classes are conducted.
- Free Coaching classes for competitive exams are conducted.
- Equal Opportunity Centre is established.

V. Health Care

- A separate room is provided for the girl students as health centre (sick room).
- Doctor on call has been arranged by the college in case of emergency.
- The health center is also provided a nurse who takes care and provides first aid to the needy and sick students.
- Programmes are conducted to create awareness on nutritious food, and hazards of junk food.
- The Students are educated to follow healthy sanitation procedures.
- Fitness equipments like tread mills are made available for the students.
- A 15 days Yoga and Meditation classes are held outside the college hours every hour.
- Once in a year Health check-up camps are organized by NSS in collaboration with the government hospital.
- Students are encouraged to involve actively in games. Games classes are conducted regularly one hour. One hour is allotted per each day for games classes.

a. Knowledge Enhancement Central-Library

The following facilities are provided to the students:

• In order to make the students computer literate and allow them to make effective use of the free laptops from the Government of Tamil Nadu, compulsory education is provided to the UG first year students. Specialised computer courses like e-commerce and Tally is provided to the Commerce students. The research students are given Orientation to use SPSS statistical software and Chem draw for Chemistry Students.

C. Language Lab

- The Department of English is in-charge of this lab and takes initiatives to develop the communicative skills among the students.
- They also arrange meetings and programmes by inviting experts from outside to develop the soft skills among the students.
- A Professional comprehensive and end-user friendly interactive language learning software tool ODLL (Orell Digital Language Lab) from Orell, India is installed in the language lab for improving the communication skills of the students which enables efficient teaching and monitoring the progress of individual students in English language.
- An interactive learning experience is provided to the students with an opportunity for self-evaluation.
- There is a facility with 36 systems. The above software has been installed in all the systems and students are allotted separate timetable to enable the maximum use of language lab for developing soft skills.

viii. Performance enhancement for slow learners / students who are at risk of failure and dropouts

- After the completion of first continous assessment, slow learners are identified with their examination performance and remedial coaching classes are conducted in all the departments to improve their academic departments.
- The slow learners are also counseled by the subject teachers to improve their performance by giving them important tips to improve their examination performance. Sample question papers, Special notes are provided to them. They are allowed to involve in group study to improve themselves.

viii. Other support services

- Hygienically prepared food items and eatables are made available in the canteen.
- Clean and safe drinking water facility is provided
- Clean toilets and rest rooms exist in the campus.
- The campus is cleaned and maintained by Self-Help group women.
- Buses are arranged in different routes to help the students to reach college safely.

ix. College Magazine

- Published annually
- Staff members contribute various articles, poems, quotations every year.
- Students contribute articles, drawing, painting, Rangoli, poem writing and other talents in the college magazine.

- The photos of all the final year students are printed in the yearly magazine.
- The Magazine committee consisting of three staff members and two students do the editing work.
- All the academic activities of the college are recorded in the college magazine along with photos.
- The magazine gives a complete record of the progress of the college during each academic year.

All the colleges conduct various programmes such as Quiz for UG, Seminar for PG, Exhibition, Paper presentation, Lectures by staff members on PG Syllabus topics are collected. One Programme by One College in rotation. Thus, the Chemistry Staff and Students of all the colleges know each other and mutually support for the development of the Departments.
- The college also has good rapport with the neighbouring institutions by sending students to participate in various curricular, co-curricular, research and community orientation.
- The college also invites students from the neighbouring institutions for participating in various curricular, co-curricular, research and community orientation.

- A Self-Help Group (SHG) is involved in the activities thus providing employment to 19 women, thereby aiding women empowerment.
- The Club gives training to women in waste Management.
- It conducts training programmes on waste Management to various SHG's of Vellore Town, creating awareness on waste Management and conservation of nature.
- All girl students are given an important message viz "Wealth out of Waste" to practice at home and away from home through our Enviro Club.

- Sports day is celebrated in a grand manner every year in which all the departments participate.
- Various cultural activities are also planned for the sports day and presented.
- Students participate in the competitions organized by the neighbouring colleges.
- Students have received certificates and medals for their participation and winning in sports events conducted by the parent university, State level sports activities and in National level sports events to G. - IQAC Collects the feedback from the students and the data is analysed through percentage and presented to the Principal.
- IQAC introduced a Self appraisal system with **API Score** from the year 2013-14 for the self assessment of the individual faculty members which helps to improve their contribution to the research and institution as a whole.
- Feedback is also collected from the students to introduce healthy changes in the academic activities of the college.

Any grievance from a parent is listened to by the concerned authority and appropriate responses are provided. Parents are contacted immediately in case of any emergency.

Parent Teacher Association

- > Once in every year the college conducts Parent- Teacher meeting. Parent-Teacher meeting has been conducted Department wise.
- > The College takes into account the views of the parents in a well structured forum like PTA while chalking out its plans.
- ➤ The views of the parents are heard through informal interactions and **feedback** is obtained through structured questionnaires as well.
- ➤ The parents are kept informed about the performance and conduct of their wards.

Teaching and Non-teaching Staff

Staff Council meetings are held at least once in a month to discuss academic matters like planning for the assessment exams, fixing/ adjusting working days, organising various programmes and matters related to student issues.

- > Staff council meetings are also convened for allocations of various funds disbursed by the UGC and special fees fund.
- ➤ General staff meetings are also convened atleast twice a semester by the Principal to plan and discuss about the general issues related to academic and other activities of the students and staff, to orient the staff for any new change in the policies and activities of the college.
- > The college considers its**Teaching** and**Non-teaching Staff** as its strong pillars. Programmes like faculty training, community lunch, celebration dinners and tours bring a sense of belongingness for the faculty members.
- ➤ Personal or Professional needs or grievances of the staff members are addressed by the college administration in the best possible manner.
- > Lunch by retiring staff, Felicitation to retiring staff. Inviting all retiring staff for all important college functions restores the feelings of togetherness among the staff even after retirement.

Industry

Due respect is given to members of the industry and ample opportunities are provided for their involvement in the programmes and activities of the college. Some of this include, campus placement drives and membership in Boards of studies, consultancy service provided by the staff to industries, training of corporate staff by our Management staff, internship to the students in the industries.

Society

- > Any significant achievement made by the institution is made known to the public by organising a press meet.
- > The college notifies the upcoming events that are planned in the Departments or centres through its website.
- ➤ All these are done with due respect to the opinion of the public regarding the endeavours at DKM College.
- ➤ A large number of awareness programmes on social issues are conducted by our social clubs. Free medical checkup, nutrition advices are provided to the public by NSS, YRC, Biochemistry and Foods and Nutrition Departments.

• Reinforcing the Culture of Excellence

- Participatory Leadership, one of the best practices of the college, is ensured at every level.
- To promote team culture, students and members of the **Non-teaching Staff** are included in working committees along with faculty members for all college functions. This work style enables them to internalise the core values and ethos of the college and enhance their sense of belonging.

Organizational Development

- Governing Board meetings are conducted regularly which consists of College Secretary, Trust members, Principal and two senior most faculty members.
- Every year during the **Academic Audit** the HODS' present the progress of the Department and grievances if any to the Internal Audit Committee consisting of The Principal as the Head and two senior faculty members.
- The Principal also takes the necessary corrective measures at all levels, in consultation with the Management so that the quality of the organizational culture is maintained.
- The Staff Council meetings and the Staff meetings which are held regularly
 provide a forum for the sharing of views and suggestions which in turn help
 the leadership to identify the needs for the development of the organization.
- The **IQAC** of the College, after a series of deliberations at various levels, makes its recommendations, and presents its various proposals to the Management through the Principal periodically for further action.
- The College ensures that senior leadership positions do not remain vacant and all positions in its various statutory bodies are filled. Meetings of the statutory bodies are conducted at stipulated intervals.
- DKM College for Women, a Government Aided Higher Educational Institution is governed by NKM Trust which was constituted in the year 1961.
- The administration strictly follows the Acts and Rules of the Government of Tamil Nadu with special reference to the Private Colleges Regulation Act 1976.
- The **Self Supporting Stream** is governed by the Trust, strictly adhering to the rules and regulations of Self Financing Colleges affiliated to the **Thiruvalluvar University**.
- The various statutory bodies are the Trust Board, College Committee, Board of Studies, Academic Council, Governing Body and Standing Committee. Apart from these, Parent - Teacher Association (PTA), Old Student Association (OSA) and Students Union discuss various issues relating to the development of students and institution.
- Trust Board Meetings are held generally once in three months with the Secretary placing before the Board various issues relating to financial requirements for various activities like maintenance of infrastructure, recruitment of faculty, academic research, extension, linkages and examinations and the decisions to be taken regarding the same. Attention paid to the needs of day to day working of the institution results in a meticulous planning and organization of activities of the College
- In the **Governing Body** meeting discussing the matters like maintenance of infrastructure, recruitment of faculty, academic research, fund utilization, extension, linkages and examinations.
- Academic Council Meetings are convened once in a year. The council takes care of the functioning of Autonomy, approval of Syllabi, Examination and Valuation of procedure. When need arises the council meets twice a year.
- Boards of Studies Meeting of various Departments are convened once in a year in order to revise and modify the syllabi. New subjects are also

- introduced. If necessity arises, board meetings will be conducted more than once in a year also.
- The **Finance committee** which consists of the Principal, Secretary and two Staff members as the members. They look into matters relating to the allocation and expenditure of various UGC Grants.
- A **Parent-Teacher Association** (PTA) meet is held once in every year to discuss matters related to student's performance, achievements and their all-round development. Instructions relating to dress code, prohibition of the use of cell phones in campus, general discipline of the college are informed to the parents. This meeting enables a cordial relationship between the staff and the parents. Parents are informed that they can meet the Department staff to discuss matters relating to academic and non- academic matters relating to their ward.
- The College Union consists of two staffs in charge and Student Chairman, Student Secretary and Various Allied Association Student secretaries headed by the respective staff association secretaries.
- The College Union meets periodically to discuss matters related to cultural, co-curricular, and Departmental activities, Teachers' day celebrations, farewell and fresher's day taking guidance from the union advisory committee.
- The Alumnae Association get-together meeting is conducted every year on the fourth Sunday of January. The Office bearers are the President, Secretary and Treasurer who are the alumnae of the college. Their feedback and suggestions will be recorded during the meeting and utilised for the welfare and development of the college.

6.1.8 How does the College groom the leadership at various levels?

- The **teaching staff** assumes leadership on the basis of seniority, qualification and experience. The non-teaching staff is selected based on their qualification and are trained to take up different roles in the office administration.
- At all levels, there is a second line leadership, ready to shoulder responsibilities, as they are identified and continuously trained.
- **Workshops** are conducted with all members of the faculty to enable experience and fresh ideas to be transmitted among each other along with the inputs from the resource person. The college organized a Workshop on Retraining and orientation for teachers during the academic year 2013-14. Workshops on Examination Reforms were organized during academic years 2012-13 and 2013-14. A Work Shop on Quality Assurance in Autonomous colleges through IQAC was organized on 29th and 30th November 2014.
- All committees are constituted with a judicious mix of junior members and senior members so that the younger members of the faculty imbibe the work culture of the college and get groomed for leadership. Such an arrangement is mutually beneficial and has a synergetic effect for the institution. The Group is also named as the **STAR GROUP**.
- The college nurtures leadership by giving autonomy to the COE, IQAC coordinator and Staff In-Charge of various committees.
- Through various **Clubs /Associations/ Cells** the college helps to groom the leadership qualities of the students and faculty members.

6.1.9 Has the College evolved any strategy for knowledge management? If yes, give details.

The College has the practice of sharing knowledge among the faculty and students of the College, though no formal strategies as Knowledge Management have been evolved. Knowledge is upgraded as per the requirements of the current scenario as and when required.

- Any learning experience by a faculty member who is deputed to attend seminars, workshops or courses outside college is shared in the Faculty Meetings or at the Department meetings.
- Students are also updated with the ideas and experiences gained from various seminars, conferences attended by the faculty members. This helps the PG students and Research Scholars to venture into new areas of Research.
- Teaching lessons presented in a class via PPT/OHP are stored with the respective faculty in all the Departments.
- The **projects** of the students are also maintained in the Departments for a certain period of time and it is shared with the successive batch of students.
- Copies of M.Phil.dissertations are in the College library and PG Project works are maintained in the Departments which can be accessed by the students.
 The librarian guides and monitors the students' access to relevant information from the library.
- A set of guidelines are provided to the faculty and Department Heads in particular, relating to various activities of the College like admission procedures, leave rules, Examination Manual by the COE, compliance to rules, conduct of Associations meetings which leads to speedy decisionmaking at various levels.
- Publication of an Arts, Science, Management journal is in progress.

Contributing to National Development

The College provides access to higher education for women students from socially and economically disadvantaged sections of the society in the following ways.

- **Remedial classes** are offered to SC/ST students and slow learners so that they will be in a position to contribute their might to the nation.
- The College makes arrangement for **scholarships** to students from socially disadvantaged sections of the society.
- Festivals like Pongal, Christmas, Navarathri, Ramzan and so on are celebrated by the NSS volunteers and other students which creates goodwill among all religious sections of the student community.
- The curriculum of various programmes offered by the College is designed in such a way that the students are motivated for an improved life style.
- **Quality research** is promoted among the faculty and the students, encouraging them to take up projects, to present papers in National and International Conferences and to publish books and papers in reputed

- journals thereby sharing their vast resources of knowledge and talent. The **Management** encourages the research through **partial funding to conferences**, offering **consultancy fees to the approved guides**.
- Students are active members of various **extension activities** and thereby understand the importance of reaching out to community and the need to contribute to the National Development.
- **Seminars and Workshops** have been organized by various Departments thereby providing a proper forum for the sharing of knowledge. During 2013-14 a five days awareness workshop from 26.02.2014 to 2.3.2014 is conducted for school children about the topic "Climate Change and biodiversity" sponsored by NCSTC. Nearly 100 students from various schools in Vellore participated and got benefitted through the programme.
- A **Self help group (SHG)** is involving the enviro club activities thus providing employment to 19 women, thereby aiding women empowerment. Training is also provided on Waste Management to various SHG Women.

Fostering Global Competencies among Students

- Since the students of the college predominantly hails from a rural set up, the College takes utmost care in equipping them with various competencies like relevant subject knowledge which is provided by their Department, compulsory computer education, Communicative English, soft skills. This is done through the Placement Cell.
- The students are taken for **industrial visits** and visits to leading **research institutions and their laboratories**.
- The **Soft Skills** paper is an inclusion in the curriculum in the UG courses to endow the students with the necessary skills to face the global competition.
- Students are also encouraged to participate in curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities organized by various academic and research organizations, thus nurturing their aptitude and scientific skills.
- Various Departments of the College organize seminars and conferences to sensitize the faculty and students on global developments in science and research. During the review period 2009-2015.
 International/National/State Level Conferences / Seminars / Workshops have been organized by the College independently or in collaboration with well established institutions/organizations.
- Faculties are motivated to be resource persons in International forums and invited to visit universities abroad.
- An MOU is in force with the Marine Bio Process research Centre, Pukyong University, Pusan, South Korea with whom the Chemistry research students involve in book writing in Academic Press, CRC Press and Apple Academics.
- Dr. P.N. Sudha has been invited as a resource person for various international conferences abroad.

Inculcating a Value System among Students

- When freshers are inducted into the institution, Orientation is given to the students by the Department HODs and the staff members about student values and ethics.
- The Curriculum is designed in such a way that it lays a strong foundation for the students on **Eco awareness and fostering value**system through Papers like Environmental Studies and Value Education are part of the curriculum during the first year UG Courses.
- Values like punctuality, honesty and self discipline are fostered through persuasion and mild corrective measures by the Head of the Department and staff members of the Department and specially by the tutors.
- **Continuous mentoring** of students by the staff members on the importance of social, cultural and personal values leaves an impact on the students.
- Seminars, discussions and debates are conducted every year to update the subject knowledge in the class room which is a part of internal assessment.
- The **Values of Healthy competition** is inculcated in the minds of students by inspiring them to pursue higher studies.
- NSS conducts seminars every year to inculcate ethnic values which in turn, emphasize the need to contribute to the national development as well.

Promoting use of technology

- The College has the required infrastructural facility for maximum usage of ICT.
- The College campus is provided with internet connectivity and Wi-Fi facility in places like Principal room, Office Room, Library, Research room, Biomaterial lab, Computer Lab, Math Lab, English Language Lab, Smart Class rooms, IQAC Mini Conference Hall, D'Block Conference Hall and Department Staff rooms.
- The Library has network resource center provided with accessibility to **E-resources** to enable research.
- With the above facilities the College promotes research creating a conducive a technology based environment and also motivates the staff and students for maximum utilization of technology.

Quest for Excellence

• At the end of every academic year, the internal academic activity committee including the IGAC team, with the Principal and the Secretary of the college meets all the Departments. They review the annual activities carried out by each Department. This exercise helps both the IGAC members and Department staff to find out why they were not able to accomplish a few of the planned activities. Suggestions and views of faculty members for effective implementation of the programme for the following year are included in the year plan designed by the college. In the same way, suggestions from students, parents, alumni and other stakeholders are received through different mechanisms and this is how the College sustains its quest for

- excellence. The college, since its inception, has been striving towards excellence.
- Lectures and workshops for the faculty and students are arranged with eminent scholars from India and abroad. Alumnae studying or working abroad are also encouraged to visit and give lectures in workshop and conferences.
- **Memorandum of Understanding (MoUs)** have been signed with Pukyong University South Korea for collaborative projects and Book writing.
- The College Management extends financial support to the Self-Financed stream, for the conduct of seminars/workshops, to various Departments.
- There is an **Integration of the Self-Financed and Aided streams** by ensuring the participation of both faculty and students in all college activities
- The teaching methodology incorporates aspects of self-learning that require students to go beyond their reference texts.
- The institution strives for the holistic development of students and caters to their needs for progression in academic as well as curricular and extracurricular activities, such as sports, debate, quiz and other cultural activities.
- The Teaching faculties are encouraged to publish research articles in National and International Journals. The Management motivates staff members by providing the required facilities to undertake minor projects and major projects funded by external agencies.
- Innovative research topics are given to the students to improve their scientific temper.
- By providing "Thought for the day" in the morning assembly by the faculty members, students are informed about important moral values.
- Student feedback is collected every year which helps for appropriate inputs for further improvement.
- The Departments facilitate the creation of a **learner-centric environment** through participatory activities conducted by NSS and other club activities will sensitizes students about the national and global demands through field trips, outreach and extension activities.
- **Restructuring or revision of the syllabi** once in three years or every year by the Department which helps to cater to the needs of the society, academic and research requirements.
- The Departments periodically conduct meetings to address issues relating to quality sustenance and quality development in various aspects of Departmental functioning.
- **Leadership training** is given frequently for faculty members by allotting duties as a team.
- Young faculty and students are motivated towards research (granting FDP leave for faculty). They are encouraged to apply for minor projects. The Principal gives training to young faculties on project proposal writing and paper writing.

6.2 STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT AND DEPLOYMENT

6.2.1 Does the College have a Perspective Plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered in development of policy and strategy. Teaching and learning

- Teaching and learning is a continuous process. The College bases itself on its good traditions gained through the experience of the past. At the beginning of the academic year, the Head of the Department addresses the first year students and discusses the main programmes of the year.
- The head of the Department also meets the staff members to share the works and responsibilities for that year.
- Care is taken to put right people to look after the new students who have come into the Department. They are introduced about the Department and its uniqueness.
- The First two weeks of classes are set aside to introduce the fundamental concept and new terminologies in their subjects. For the rest of the students, the classes will go on as usual.
- **External Experts** are invited by the PG and Research Departments to present lectures on the topics with national relevance to impart better understanding on the current topics.

- **Smart Classrooms** are also utilized by the Faculty members to present an Audio-Visual based information that provides more impact on the topics discussed.
- **Remedial Coaching Classes** are also systematically organized by all the Departments to cater to the need of the slow learners.
- Advanced learners are provided with more inputs to improve their academic performance and are encouraged to participate in competitions, paper presentation in seminars and conferences and poster presentation.
- Guest Lecture meetings are organized by all the departments to give the students a broad idea of the topics which are inclusive of their curriculum.
- Study Circle plays a vital role to encourage the students to take up various competitive exams for their personal development.

Future Plan

- Training the trainers programmes is proposed to be strengthened and implemented in a continuous manner for both teaching and non-teaching staff members.
- More usage of ICT to be encouraged among students and staff.
- Study Circle to be strengthened to impart service to the non members of the institution.
- Language Centre is in the process of introduction to impart Chinese language to the Students.

Research and development

- At present the College has eight Ph.D. Research Departments and ten M.Phil. Courses. Other Departments also will gain research status in the near future.
- The Ph.D Research scholars in their respective Departments meet regularly and share matters and areas relating to research and research trends.
- **Group seminars** are conducted for sharing the knowledge in different research topics.
- Staff and students participate in writing research articles.
- UG and PG students having inclination towards research are given orientation and they are motivated to take up higher studies leading to research.
- M.Phil students are encouraged to continue their research projects in various industries and institutions.
- Ph.D scholars are motivated to apply for minor research projects sponsored by DST.
- Mini Project has been introduced to the UG students with the Extra credit to encourage them to involve in research activities.
- A Summer Internship training programme is introduced with an extra credit to the UG students to undergo on-the-job training to make employable in the job market.

- There is a Plan to establish a research centre which will provide separate room for the investigator, laboratory facilities, library facilities and advanced instrumentation centre.
- The College has Biomaterials research lab in Chemistry Department, which is striving towards excellence through their research activities.

Community Engagement

The College in its democratic committees has members from the public, the alumni, the students and industry persons thus involving the public in the interest of the institution and vice versa. The staff in turn takes up community engagements through extension programmes such as Medical Camps, Rally, Awareness Camps with the community for the benefit of the both.

Human resource planning and development

- The College follows a charter of roles and functions for its Management personnel and the staff.
- Only qualified persons are recruited for teaching and non-teaching staff. They are briefed about their roles to bring about a coordination and team spirit among them.
- Faculties are sent out to participate in workshops, conferences who thereby update their knowledge.
- Annual training programmes like Seminar on Examination Reforms and Seminar on Orientation and Retraining for teachers are conducted within the College.
- A Special training programmes on use of computers, use of office software are provided to the Non-Teaching staff.
- Training Programmes on use of internet resources for Teaching and Learning is provided to staff.
- It is also planned to make the members of staff and students to enroll in suitable online certificate courses.

Industry interaction

- Institution Industry link has become the need of the day. Gone are the days that they stood isolated. The industries would like to select and train their own employees, as they want them to be.
- The placement cell of the College invites **eminent industrialists** to create awareness about various **job opportunities available** in the job market.
- The Departments are organizing more and more **industrial visits** to give a first-hand knowledge of jobs for their graduates.
- The Department also has representatives from the industry in Board of Studies thus drawing their expertise for the benefit of the institution.
- Planned to expand the industry academia interaction.
- More MOU's to be signed with industries for training and placement of students.

Internationalisation

The Department of Chemistry has a strong interaction with the international universities for their research and publications. More Staff members will be encouraged and allowed to participate in international conferences abroad so that their research work can be made known to the whole world.

- The **Secretary** of the College is the chief functionary and head of the Board of Management.

- The **Head of the Department** motivate and encourage the staff and students of their departments to participate in academic, extracurricular and research activities. They also contribute their views and suggestions for the development of the students and staff.
- The HODs and other staffs assist the Principal in coordinating the curricular, co-curricular and extension activities.
- The **Office** takes care of the infrastructure, maintenance and enhancement of physical facilities.
- The **Planning Board and IQAC** meets and chalks out the entire plan for the year and caters to the academic development of the College.

- The **calendar** is prepared by the committee consisting of senior most faculty members in consultation with the head of the institution.

- The Quality policy is designed on the basis of Vision and Mission of the College.
- All the academic and allied activities of the college are planned and executed to fill the quality policy.
- The College consciously makes an effort to maintain quality through its regularity of work, commitment to human and noble values, frequent checks and balances that enhance further development.
- The Management sees to it that as far as possible only qualified teachers are recruited and trained. Many innovative methods are introduced as part of learning.
- Research is taken up in the Departments as every staff member is asked to complete her Ph. D at the earliest.
- The self appraisal of the staff members is collected and the Principal discusses with them and their suggestions are considered for implementing new ideas for their development.
- Feedback is collected from the students and analysed any important suggestions are considered for further development.

- The **Students Grievance Redressal Committee** comprises of three faculty members inclusive of the College librarian, the Physical Directress, One Senior most Staff, and One U.G and P.G Student.
- This committee meets every month and they discuss the common grievances of the students and suggest suitable mechanism to resolve it.
- Whenever need arises the committee conducts emergency meeting to immediately resolve urgent issue.
- A complaint box is also placed before the Principal's Office and the students utilize it in case of necessity.

Every teacher specially newly inducted teachers receive feedback in a non-formal manner to find their strengths and weaknesses and make every effort to correct the same.

• **Departments collect feedback** from the students after each programme to get suggestions for further improvement of the programme.

- **Centralised feedback** system is followed to collect feedback from the final year students to know about the strengths and weaknesses of the college which will be addressed in an effective manner.
- **Evaluation of all the Committees** of the College is undertaken. Besides there is student feedback on the staff and the curriculum received at the end of every year and remedial measures are adopted.
- The feedback on the functioning of the institution from **non-teaching**, **teaching**, **parents** and **alumni** is taken up during the course of the year for institutional SWOC analysis and remedial measures are taken.
- In accordance with the feedback received from the students, the Heads of Departments, Librarian and Controller of Examinations, corrective measures are suggested to the staff for a healthy progress of the institution.
- The welfare of the students is always taken as a major consideration for introducing changes in the educational system.

Yes, from the year 2015-16 a college development council is constituted by Thiruvalluvar University to which our college is affiliated to.

- The feedback is collected from Non teaching staff, Parents and Alumnae separately through a simplified questionnaire in vernacular language.
- The feedback collected are analysed by the IQAC and presented it to the Principal for further discussion.
- The Principal discusses with the Heads of the Departments to suggest measures for improvement.
- The individual or committee or department will be called for discussion with the Principal to finalise the process for resolving the problem if any.

6.2.10 Does the College encourage autonomy to its academic departments and how does it ensure accountability?

- All major decisions by the Management are taken democratically after a series of meetings and consultations with the Heads of Departments, College Council, and members of staff.
- The Secretary and the Principal hold periodic discussions with the staff on matters relating to professional ethics, teaching methodology, innovations, student support, research activities and computer literacy.
- Some **practical and useful suggestions** are given to students for effective interaction with them in and outside the classrooms.
- The members of the teaching and administrative staff are encouraged to dedicate themselves whole heartedly keeping in mind the future of the students entrusted to their care.
- There has been a gradual and active involvement of the staff in academic decision-making.
- **Delegation of powers and responsibilities** to the Heads of Departments, Presidents of Associations, Staff Secretary, Academic Council and College Council has enabled the faculty to discuss their opinions in the respective forums, particularly during the staff meetings.
- The sub-committees set up for different purposes play a great role in the process of decision-making.
- Autonomy with respect to student admissions is given to the Departments to admit students based on merit as per the Government norms. Before releasing the provisional list of students selected for admission, the Principal and the admission committee validates the list with regard to compliance with admission norms.
- In academic programmes, the Department is given the freedom to design different courses. Prior to the Board of Studies of each Department, the rationales for all the academic changes proposed are discussed with the staff members. Departments are given the freedom to constitute the panel of external members for the Boards of Studies.

- The College conducts **Internal Academic Audit** every year by Academic Audit Committee members consisting of the Senior most member as the Coordinator and IQAC members as its other members.
- A format is provided to the Department to submit their reports to the Internal Academic Committee members.
- The report is collected by the Internal Academic Audit members and presented to the Principal for further discussion.
- After the completion of Internal Academic Audit, the External Academic
 Audit is conducted to streamline our academic activities to suit the quality
 requirement of the institution.
- Individual Performance Audit is conducted through API scoring method for the faculty members to improve their performance.

6.3 FACULTY EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES

6.3.1 What efforts are made by the College to enhance the professional development of teaching and non teaching staff?

Professional development of teaching staff:

- Staff enrichment and development programmes are conducted separately for different categories of staff. Seminars on preventive system of education, quality enhancement, research methodology, SPSS programme, creative thinking are conducted periodically.
- To enhance their **professional competency**, the teaching staffs are encouraged to **attend orientation and refresher courses**. Orientation and refresher courses attended by our staff members at UGC-Academic Staff Colleges lift a positive impact on the competence level of our staff.
- They are exhorted to computerize the **continuous assessment marks** and correspond through **intra-network**.
- The staffs are encouraged to attend and present papers at international, national and state level seminars and conferences.
- The College organizes an **annual enrichment programme** for the teaching and non –teaching staff for a period of 3-5 days at the beginning of every academic year.

Professional Development of Non-teaching Staff

- The office administration has undergone several stages of significant improvement over the past six years.
- The **fee structure**, **students daily attendance**, **salary**, **income tax**, **P.F.**,**accounts** and **admission processes** have been computerized. The office automation has ensured accuracy, accountability and transparency.
- The office staffs were given **training on the use of computers** for the implementation of the above programmes. The office staffs were given training on official etiquette, administration, time Management, planning and execution of work.
- Reshuffling of office work is done to enable all the members to acquire
 proficiency in all the office work. They are sent to the office of the Regional
 Joint Director on rotation to familiarize themselves with the office work.

6.3.2 What is the outcome of the review of the Performance Appraisal Reports? List the major decisions Teaching Staff

- The **self-appraisal system** is in vogue as a routine affair for the purpose of quality enhancement. Besides, the College appraises the performance of the teaching staff through the feedback from students, appraisal from their respective HODs, peer group and the Management.
- The students are provided with a **performance based questionnaire** and the answers obtained give an objective view of the course teacher and teaching methodology.

- The **subject-wise percentage of passes** and the difference between the first and second valuation go to show the quality and efficiency of a teacher by means of comparison and contrast.
- **API indexing** of performance appraisal of staff members was started from the year 2013-2014

Non-Teaching Staff

• The Principal holds meetings once a month with the non-teaching staff. Ideas and suggestions are shared in the meeting. The Principal briefs the members on her observations in the course of the month.

Outcome

- Through the process of performance appraisal, pass percentage of the students, enrollment for PG courses are increased.
- **Review of self performance**has made changes in the attitude of the staff members. They find their strengths and weaknesses and a healthy competition exists among the staff for self and students development.
- The staff members in the process of achieving better API index have started involving themselves in many activities including research which has made the whole college vibrant.

- **Staff welfare schemes** like loan facility through Staff Welfare Fund are in place for both teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Some of the retired teaching staffs are retained as visiting professors.
 Similarly services of even retired and dedicated non-teaching staff are solicited.
- **Medical Benefit** -Health centre with nurse and doctor on call has been appointed to provide service throughout the working days.
- PF As per Government norms
- Gratuity As per Government norms.
- Transport facility An affordable transport facility is provided
- Facility for availing **Housing loan & Education loan** is provided by issuing the required certificates.
- **Festival Bonus** and special advances are given as per government norms.
- **Maternity Leave with pay**—is allowed for the staff members. Even student mothers are provided maternity leave and the staff help them to complete their practicals.
- Marriage Leave with Pay Marriage leave of 10 days will be given with pay.

6.3.4 What are the measures taken by the College for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

- **Work environment** is very conducive to attract and retain eminent faculty members
- There is **no record of harassment**, which is highlighting and ensures safety.

- The college provides **fairly good salary** to the teaching and non teaching staff members.
- Another golden policy of the college is to motivate the performance of the faculty members both teaching and non teaching for their contribution to the development of the college.

6.4 FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND RESOURCE MOBILIZATION

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources?

- The annual budget of the College is projected through the financial statement of the aided courses. The deficit is made good by diverting the money from the Management funds to aided courses. Only the salary of the staff of the aided courses is fully met by the Government Even here the vacant posts are compensated by visiting lecturers and paid by the Management, as many aided course still remain unfilled.
- For Self Financing courses the entire financial planning and execution is done by the management.
- The **Finance Committee** of the College meets on a regular basis to monitor the effective and efficient use of financial resources from special fees and other grants from agency such as UGC.
- The audit is done by a Chartered Accountant and by the Office of Joint Directorate of Collegiate Education and also by Accountant General's office.
- The budget for the expenditure on the heads such as Association activities, Student Aid Fund, Stationery, Audio-visual, Magazine and Calendar and Handbook is inadequate.
- The income from fees for laboratory and games and sports does not cover the expenses. All additional expenditure on infrastructure development and maintenance is borne by the Management.
- The Management also undertakes the general repairs, maintenance of vehicles, buildings, equipments, hostels, gardens, playgrounds, workshop,

electricity, telephone charges and generators. Protracted power cuts during the working hours which are supplemented by generator have punched deep holes into the finances of the institution.

6.4.2 Does the College have a mechanism for internal and external audit? Give details.

- Accounts of aided courses of the previous year are audited by an external auditor.
- All the accounts related to the UGC funds are also audited through an external auditor and are submitted to the UGC in time.
- Accounts of the unaided courses are audited by an external auditor appointed by the management.

- The accounts of the College are audited regularly as per the Government rules. An internal auditor audits our accounts every quarter.
- The internal auditor checks receipts with fee receipts and payments with vouchers and necessary supporting documents. He also ensures that all payments are duly authorized.
- The external auditor conducts statutory audit at the end of the financial year.

- The college takes every step to mobilize resources as per the norms to be utilized for the development of the students.
- Tuition fee is the major source of income for this institution.
- The management is investing the funds for infrastructural developmental like building construction and other lab equipments which are all of capital nature.
- The college collects nominal fee for Hostel and Transportation.
- The management is taking keen interest in depositing excess funds in fixed deposit for short term and long term to confirm the continuous flow of funds.

6.5 INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE SYSTEM

6.5.1 Does the College conduct an academic audit of its departments? If yes, give details.

DKM has an internal academic audit committee to improve the educational quality system, which includes a continuous improvement process, better interaction among faculty, students and self assessment which provides accountability and valued added results. This is successful due to the

commitment of the faculty, transparency in admission and participatory leadership. This committee is aimed at assessing the institutional processes for the purpose of identifying the limitations and take preventive measures before the visit of external academic audit. Internal Academic Audit is conducted once in a year and the functioning of the various clubs and Departments are also audited. The **experienced and senior most faculty members** and the **staff representatives are deputed for auditing** and finally the report given by them is to improve the quality as a whole.

6.5.2 Based on the recommendations of academic audit what specific measures have been taken by the College to improve teaching, learning and evaluation?

After the conduct of the audit, the internal auditors highlight the best practices, suggest areas of improvement for all Departments. Any non-conformance observed is recorded by the auditor and reported to the auditee. Effort is made to know the cause of non-conformance and appropriate time-bound corrective actions are taken. The succeeding audit ensures the satisfactory completion of corrective and preventive action. This process has enabled the college to take the following specific measures:

- Induction of intensive remedial programmes for the courses where the performance is below average.
- Change from an informal to a formal written format for collection feedback from stakeholders whenever necessary.
- Arrangement of Guest lectures for courses in emerging areas.
- Special lectures by outside experts for PG courses in specific topics is organized by the departments whenever necessary.
- NET / SET study circle is functioning actively for encouraging the students to get employed in the teaching profession and research.
- Upgradation of English language lab is another notable outcome for the benefit of the students.
- Introduction of Mini project, Internship training with extra credit for UG students is an additional measure to encourage research attitude.
- Maximum utilization of ICT enabled teaching is a landmark for making the teaching and learning process simplified by use of technology.

6.5.3 Is there a central body within the College to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The Curriculum Planning Evaluation Cell (CPEC) is the body in the college that continuously reviews the Teaching – Learning and evaluation process.

Methodologies of Operations

The functions of the Planning and Evaluation committee are elaborated as follows:

• Introducing progressive academic changes through workshops and discussion sessions with experts in various fields.

- Designing the total curriculum of the college, keeping in view the purpose of the college, changes in society and current trends in education;
- Reviewing of feasibility study report of the Department before the introduction of new courses/programmes.
- Evaluation courses periodically and systematically, keeping in mind:
 - Revisions based on Higher Secondary Course Syllabi
 - programmes of other colleges and universities of reputation
 - > the felt needs of students
- Revising and updating the pattern of evaluation
- Providing guidelines for Formative and Summative Evaluation
- Integrating Extension Services with the Academic Curriculum.

Significant Outcomes

- Designing and modifying the curriculum

IQAC has been actively functioning in the college since 2004 with the thrust on academic excellence. The main task of IQAC is planning and monitoring and this is accomplished through the following functions:

- Disseminating information on the various quality parameters of higher education
- Documenting the various quality enhancing programmes/activities of the college.

- **Remedial coaching** is the best practice followed by the college to improve the academic performance of the students.
- Student counseling is also done through the student counselor appointed by the college to support the psychological and social problems among the students from disadvantaged sections of the society.

INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

INTRODUCTION

In its continuous endeavor to provide quality education to socially downtrodden young women from rural areas, D.K.M. College for Women has been constantly striving to upgrade the ambience and methodology in which the learning process takes place. They are as follows

In a scenario where education is increasingly being seen as a mechanized money spinner, the college makes certain practices mandatory that instill a sound value system in the students rendering them socially responsible citizens and morally upright individuals; further DKM College prides itself on these practices and considers that they represent the ethos of the institution envisaged by the founder Mr. N. Krishnaswamy Mudaliar.

7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

7.1.1 Does the College conduct a Green Audit of its campus?

Green Audit is done every year by the Enviro Club.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the College to make the campus eco-friendly?

The College has an active **Enviro-club** that takes adequate care to make the campus eco-friendly. The coordinator and its members are effectively contributing for the betterment of the campus with **Zero-Waste Management**. The following initiatives are undertaken to keep the college environment clean and eco-friendly.

- The College ensures a **pollution-free atmosphere** with a good air quality and drinking water facility.
- The **microbial analysis** of the air and water quality inside the campus is performed by the Department of Microbiology every year.
- A **reverse osmosis** plant is installed in the college that ensures pure drinking water to the students.
- The College Campus is kept free from wastes as they are disposed at regular intervals so that the college is kept clean. The vegetable and other perishable wastes from the canteen are also disposed for **composting** which is used to increase the **fertility of the soil**.
- The College has a waste Management unit which is effectively managed by the enviro-club where segregation of waste is practiced. The college also enlisted the members of a women's **Self Help Group** who help for the development and maintenance of the Enviro-Club. The students who are members actively participate in the Enviro- club activities.
- The plastic wastes are segregated and sent for recycling to enable Zero Waste Management.

- The College has embarked on a **green drive** wherein only paper plates and cups are encouraged in the campus keeping it **plastic free**.
- True to the **tree plantation** drives initiated by India, the promotion of tree plantation is enabled which is mostly done at the back of the college campus where the college is maintaining an organic vegetable and flower garden which helps to balance the carbon levels in the atmosphere.

One of the major problems that are staring at the world is the effective Management of the existing energy resources, especially petrol, power and water.

*Energy Conservation

The college focuses on **power conservation** as a priority. Many **CFL bulbs** are installed in the campus to facilitate conservation. The users have been instructed to shut down the computers and monitors, in the campus, when not used. The college community ensures that all the lights, fans, air conditioners and other electrical equipments are switched off immediately after use. The alternative energy resources in campus include installation of solar lamps to minimize electricity consumption.

*Use of renewable energy

The College has Solar panels installed for apping the abundantly available solar energy. As the college has cowdung is abundantly available from the fourteen cows the enviro club takes care of biogas plant is installed which provides energy which is used in the hostel for cooking.

To avoid the wastage of water, the college plumbers are on the lookout to arrest leakage of water from taps and tubes. Water conservation techniques are used wherever necessary to reduce water wastage. The students are constantly reminded of the importance of water and electricity and their conservation.

*Water Harvesting

As water is a fast depleting resource in the country, especially as Vellore is a very dry area, not a drop of rainwater is allowed to drain off. A **rain water harvesting system** is in place, by which all the runoff water is collected and sent to ground well from where it is supplied to the college. The harvested rain water is collected in a tank and is used by all the Department laboratories and for watering the garden.

*Efforts for Carbon neutrality

Efforts to plant more trees to ensure carbon neutrality is taken

*Plantation

College has good number of trees in the available space. Tree plantation is a regular activity of NSS and NCC.

*Hazardous waste management

No hazardous waste is generated.

Chemical waste is disposed properly.

*e-waste management

The obsolete computers and other wastes generated from the electronic

equipments are given to the authorized e-waste dealers and hazardous materials in those equipments are removed and disposed as per the norms. The old computers are also exchanged with new computers.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

7.2.1 Provide details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the College Autonomy with CBCS system

In accordance with the model curricula proposed by UGC with the thrust areas like modernization of teaching, strengthening research, support of outreach programme,

CBCS has been introduced in all the Departments of the College in 2008. Though **Cafeteria system** is not implemented 100%, students have the choice to select their elective and non-major subjects and in few cases even allied papers are made choice based.

The introduction of papers like E- Business and its applications, E-Commerce, E- Marketing and E-Banking (Department of Commerce), Fuzzy Mathematics (Department of Mathematics), Chemistry in Everyday life, Green Chemistry and Medicinal Chemistry which includes Drug design and development (Department of Chemistry), Food product development and marketing strategy & Nutraceuticals (Department of Foods & Nutrition) sustain the interest of the students and motivates them to pursue further research.

Teaching Learning and Evaluation Process

Teaching Learning Process is better facilitated with the Inputs from other sources and student ready presentations by the teachers, YouTube demonstrations of experiments. Industrial awareness is provided to the students by way of field and industrial visits and industry interface. Presentation of papers in National/International conferences is mandatory for some courses. The students are motivated and encouraged to present paper in the campus.

The semester evaluation system is modified by the introduction of external question paper setters, external evaluators, and papers with viva-voce. The examination results and related announcements are published in the college website, as and when necessary.

Research and Extension

The Research Cell of DKM College is active. The Cell conducts group meetings with the Ph.D. holders and Ph.D. aspirants (named as star group of the college) to motivate them on active research in the campus.

Staff members are encouraged to apply for projects and given full guidance by the Cell.

A new reference section has been established in the library with online journals and internet facilities for the use of research scholars and staff. Journals are donated by Vellore Institute of Technology (VIT) which are very useful for the science researchers to search their work in the back volumes.

The staff is encouraged and sponsored by the Management to attend various regional, national and international conferences and workshops.

Staff members who secured awards for their excellence in research, social service are honoured by the Management during the college day function.

Based on the requirement, Enrichment programmes ranging from academic to skill development are organized for selected target group of faculty members.

As a part of extension work the college staff members serve as counselors and coordinators for IGNOU Study Centre, chairman, Board of Studies and members of Board of Studies of Thiruvalluvar University and other autonomous colleges.

Governance

- Our College follows the hierarchy for the Planning, Implementation and Execution of all activities. The hierarchy follows from the Management with the President and Secretary followed by the Principal, Head of the Departments follow the hierarchy. All decisions are taken with the consent of the Management and Principal.
- The Management gives active support in all the Academic Endeavours. The Management is providing financial support magnanimously to the students in the form of fees concession, cash incentives and other need based facilities for the welfare of the students.
- All staff members actively participate in the decision making process in the academic activities which is encouraged by the Management.
- The Coordinators of the various committees participate in decision making for their respective committees.
- The Office Administration functions smoothly to maintain the records, admission process, disbursement of scholarship, and all other activities relating to students development. They bridge the gap between the Academics and Administration.

Controller of Examinations

The COE office is upgraded with equipments like printer, photocopier and IBM server, automation software used for examination system.

Preparation of subject codes, updation of student details, processing the applications, hall ticket, internal marks, external marks, result publications, revaluation steps, students strength list, dummy numbers and foil sheets are done through Software.

Evaluation System

The introduction of Grade System for the courses, automated maintenance of the profiles of External Examiners and question paper setters, scrutiny board to scrutinize the question papers, providing photocopies of answer scripts to the students, the centralized assessment examinations,

introduction of a new type of Answer Booklet for Semester Examinations, shuffling of the answer scripts and allotment of dummy numbers for evaluation in Semester Examinations are some of the innovations introduced to ensure a transparent and fair examination system in the college. Separate exams for the sports and NCC students are conducted to facilitate them to participate in the activities without any academic hindrances.

College Office

The college has a well-maintained and smooth functioning office, administration that forms the backbone of the governance. Staff and student profiles are gathered and kept for reference. Files are maintained in racks in a secured room. The Office also takes utmost care for the students to be benefitted by receiving all monetary benefits through scholarships. All efforts are taken by the college office for the smooth functioning of the college.

Library

The entry of the student and staff into the library is tracked through a Barcode Swiping Machine. The movements inside the library are monitored through four Closed Circuit Television cameras (CCTV). New cabinets for the periodical Back Issues have been acquired. The library system is **automated through SOUL 2.0 version (a Library Software) and Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC)**. UGC Inflibnet – N- LIST programme is also available in the library. The circulations of books are being facilitated through bar-coded books and identity Cards. A photocopier is available in the library. Library hour is compulsory for all the classes through which students are encouraged to use the library. PG and M.Phil students use the library exhaustively as a reliable source of information. The librarians encourage the library users by guiding them to search a book, informing the new arrivals in stand, displaying the hot articles in the journals in the notice board.

Co-curricular and Extracurricular Activities

The Co-curricular and extracurricular activities **are mandatory for every student**. Each Department has an academic association that plans and executes their academic related activities that concludes with a valediction, which includes a feedback on the activities. The Fine Arts Day, Sports Day and Muthamizh Vizha are also organized annually to allow students to show case their talents.

The Students are encouraged to go to various institutions to participate in programmes like Seminars, Conferences related to their subjects. Most often they come back to the college with Prizes and Medals. The Management recognizes the student achievements through Cash awards or Prizes. Usually the Prize winners are felicitated in the Monday Assembly to motivate and encourage all the students.

Sports

To provide a holistic growth to the students, sports activities are given due importance. Sports Day is conducted annually in which the girls participate with great vigor and competitive spirit, University blues are also obtained by many of our students each year.

- Coaches are arranged for the games like Football, Kho-Kho, Cricket, Kabbadi, Volley Ball and Badminton, to train the students for Inter divisional and Inter Universities Competitions.
- Students are provided with Sports Apparels to facilitate a discipline team.
- Energy Drinks like Glucose and snacks like Biscuits are provided to the players everyday who participate in the coaching classes.
- The best sports students at National level are given fees concession for the completion of their degree.
- Attendance is given to the students participating in coaching classes and to students participating in competitions.
- Special coaching classes are also arranged to the sports students to manage their academic performance.
- Special Exams like continuous assessment and semester exams are conducted to the participants in sports competitions at various levels to complete their course within the stipulated time.

Assembly

College Prayer assembly is conducted an every Mondays. Students read the latest news, recite Thirukural and tell the meaning. A staff member gives good morning thought, during which she will be stressing up and the values to be followed in our life through interesting stories. The prize winners in various events conducted by other institutions will be felicitated during this occasion each week.

Career Guidance and Placement Cell

Career guidance and placement cell organizes job oriented training programmes for the students. To make all the final year UG and PG students, industry-ready, soft skill trainings are given. Coaching for SET /NET is undertaken by all the Departments. In addition to these, on-campus and off-campus placement initiatives are undertaken by this cell.

NET/SET study circle is formed in all the PG Departments in which the staff and students are members. Expert training, discussion on specific topics, exchange of notes is done in the circle. The members meet three Saturdays a month. This is a new initiative which the college feels will be a great success in future.

Value Based Education

Credits are awarded to courses in value education, human rights and environmental studies and a pass, is mandatory for the award of the degree. All the Departments participate in teaching and evaluation of these courses.

Eco awareness

The College has a **cowshed** with 14 cows. The **Cow dung** is used to produce vermicompost. African worm *Eurdilus euginae* is used for preparing Vermicompost. The compost is used as manure in the vegetable garden. The **100% organic vegetables and greens** are sold to the staff and students. The **milk is used in the hostel**. The hostel food waste is used for cows to feed. Other than Vermicomposting **windrow composting and aerobic composting** are also practiced. This being a model Zero Waste Management system our Enviro Club is visited by many colleges **NGO's** and thus it acts as a training platform.

Grievance Redressal Cell

Grievance Redressal Cell looks into the grievances of the students. It was setup in view of effectively addressing the problems of the students. A complaint box is installed in the campus and students are free to post their grievance if any and effective measures are taken immediately to address the problems. To Support further to the psychological, sociological and emotional issues a student support centre is functioning.

Student Support Centre

We strive for a holistic development of the students by organizing yoga classes, good morning and good afternoon talks, thought for the day and news reading in assembly. Students are given counseling and health care facilities via Student Support Centre.

- A Student Counselor is appointed by the College to counsel the students for their Psychological, Sociological and Emotional problems. The counseling is done on individual basis to support and counsel the students for the above issues. Individual Counseling is given to prevent suicide attempts and for other teen age distractions.
- Classroom counseling is also done to address adolescent age problems, Suicide, and technology addiction.
- Group Counseling is also conducted to motivate the students to improve their Academic Performance and motivate them to participate in Co-Curricular and Extra-Curricular Activities.
- Various Awareness Programmes under the umbrella of NSS Activities are organized by the students support centre to create awareness on issues related to psychological and emotional imbalances.

Quality Management

- The College has initiated monitoring bodies, such as Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), Class Quality Circle (CQC) and Curriculum Development Cell (CDC) to maintain Quality standards in the institute.
- Special orientation programme for the young staff members are organized regularly.
- No class hour is left free; it is always substituted by another staff member.

- Regular meetings are conducted by each Department to discuss the matters related to the quality maintenance through teaching and curriculum design.
- Strict adherence towards the attendance of the students, punctuality to classes, regularity for exams, dress code are monitored by the staff members to enable quality academic environment.
- Tutor ward system is systematically planned through which the students are well monitored in their academic performance and their all round development.
- Examination process is monitored by an external member nominated by the college for smooth conduct of the exams and to maintain quality thereby.
- Evaluation process is done in a centralized manner to evaluate the students exam performance through internal and external examiners which ensures quality.

Antiragging cell

Antiragging cell takes care of ragging free campus. On the first day of college reopening, first year students are informed about the cell and even second year and third years are also been educated to keep a cordial relationship with their juniors.

7.3 BEST PRACTICES

D.K.M. College for Women, Vellore caters to the needs of the rural women by providing them the need based education. The students are from the low income group families. They are the first generation but aspiring learners. Fully equipped with relevant information/knowledge, the Principal is able to carry out the day to day activities of the college effectively and coordinates the cross sectional interaction among the various stakeholders. This, in turn, helps the institution to have a much focused approach towards the realization of the core values of Higher Education.

With this scenario the college strives to impart quality education through the following,

- In view of the **emerging security threats** in India, CCTV cameras are installed at all strategic points in college to strengthen the security system of the college.
- With all Committees headed by the Principal and committee members; it becomes easier to determine the short term and long term goals and objectives of the institution aligning the vision and mission of the College. The decisions relating to the goals and objectives are made with an enhanced understanding of the actual operational realities. The relevant information is easily passed on to the faculty who play a vital role in evolving the processes by which the decisions are implemented. The benchmarks are clearly spelt out in the beginning of the year itself.
- Over a period of time the College has been constantly engaged in trying to
 ensure a more objective and transparent testing method by which the goals

- of **participatory learning** would be met while maintaining academic standards.
- As details of tests are printed in the **college calendar**, students do not have to appear for over-lapping tests conducted on the same day by different disciplines. Students can plan their work around the dates as shown in the college calendar.
- Since students are allowed to check their marks and participate in the calculation of the internal assessment marks same, it instills confidence and satisfaction in the **assessment process**, which is fair and **transparent**.
- The streamlining of the assessment process has resulted in a systematic completion of the syllabus on time.
- The internal assessment component is for **25 marks**, and the End semester examination is for **75 marks**. The student is declared passed if she secures a minimum of **40%** in the end semester examination when both the internal assessment and end semester components are added together.
- The **internal assessment** is continuous and spaced evenly through the 90 day semester. Student progress is assessed through 2 internal assessment and a model exam which are marked in the College calendar and scheduled to be held after **50%**,**75%** and **100%** of the completion of the syllabus.
- 20 marks for the internal Assignments are judged on the basis of appearance, content, originality, presentation/schematic representation and diagrams and bibliography. Out of 25 internal marks 2 marks are allotted for assignments for the UG Students.
- **Seminars** are evaluated on the basis of organization of matter, subject knowledge, and use of visual aids, confidence displayed and overall presentation. Out of 25 internal marks **1 mark** are allotted for Class Seminars for the UG Students.
- In **projects** the evaluation is done on the basis of preliminary work or design of the project, its content and presentation. Out of 25 internal marks **2 marks** are allotted for Projects for the UG Students.
- Marks are maintained in **registers in the Departments**. Student signatures are obtained in these registers before submission of those internal marks to the COE to ensure transparency
- The Principal, along with the COE and Heads of Departments, analyze the end semester results.
- The **COE office conducts workshops on examination** reforms such as training on item writing, preparation of multiple choice questions, methodology to be followed for evaluation and so on.
- **Remedial coaching** classes are regularly conducted by all the departments to improve academic performance of the students.
- **Tutor ward system** with issue of rank card facility is systematically followed by all the departments. The students are assessed after their Continuous Assessments and required assistance is provided for their development.
- **Parent Teachers Meeting** is conducted once in every year. This enables to share their views for student development.

- **Research** is the one of the prime objective of our college. It is gradually increasing both Department wise and also in Student Enrollment number. It is one of the **best practices** followed by the institution.
- Various clubs like NSS, NCC, YRC, RRC, Enviro club, CCC, Rotaract and EDP strives hard to provide awareness on various social and health issues. They also conduct actives which bring about all round development of the students.

The mentioned are some of our best practices followed by our college.

BEST PRACTICES-1

ENVIRO CLUB ACTIVITIES

To make the students and staff as effective managers of the environment they live in

1. Context

In the post-industrial technology driven, consumerist world, man has been exploiting the rich natural resources and wealth that are found in abundance in the planet. In this drive to achieve complete mastery over nature, man mindlessly loots, destroys and exhibits a disgusting callousness towards the environment that sustains and nurtures him. So it is no wonder that we are threatened with the burning issues - be it global warming, green-house effect, the depletion of ozone layer extinction of the many valuable flora and fauna- all results due to massive pollutants released into the boson of mother earth, choking her very breath.

Given this global scenario, it is pertinent to say that in a developing economy like India, environment concerns are more pressing as the country fares depressingly low in environment awareness and it is of paramount importance that educational institutions take the responsibility to instill and inculcate eco-sensitivity in today's youth and transform them into eco-friendly individuals with a keen desire to conserve the already diminishing natural resources. Also Vellore is very near to Ranipet and Ambur Industrial areas. Ranipet Industrial area is established as World's fifth most polluted areas by Blacksmith Institute, USA. Hence most of the researches in DKM College and activities are encircled with a common cause Remediation of the polluted soils and water of Ranipet Industrial area. This laudable goal is behind the creation of the Enviro Club in DKM College which has "Nurture Nature, live in Nature's way" as its slogan.

2. Objectives

- To generate awareness on important environmental issues and pollution.
- To build a green campus.
- To educate the student community to adopt an eco-friendly attitude and protect the eco-system.
- To adopt and train Zero Waste Management of solids.
- To adopt and train waste water management.

3. Unique Features

- 1. Club supported by physical, knowledge and financial from the Management, principal staff and students.
- 2. Club is run by the II year UG students of different departments.
- 3. Finance managed by the students.
- 4. A Self-Help Groups (SHG) is involved in the activities thus providing employment to 19 women, supporting women empowerment.
- 5. Club gives training to women for waste Management.
- 6. Conducts training programmes on waste Management to various SHG's of Vellore Town, creating awareness on waste Management and conservation of nature.
- 7. Waste management training programmes are conducted to school children, college students through workshops and prize awarded.
- 8. All girl students are given an important message of "Wealth out of Waste" home and away from home through our Enviro Club.
- 9. Student projects on waste management funded by Enviro Club.
- 10. Collaborative awareness and training programs conducted to school teachers in charge of National green corps on conservation of ecology and waste management.

Activities of Enviro-Club

Composition and quantities of various wastes generated at different sections of the college and hostel were initially studied. They are vegetables and fruit scraps, jam cans, bottles, tetra packs, plastic bags, combs, mirrors, newspapers, biscuit wrappers, cloths and sanitary napkins.

Fruit and vegetable scraps, tea dust, egg shells, plastic cups and covers and corrugated boxes are collected from the hostels and college canteen.

Paper and thermocole, biscuit packets, bottles, wrappers, hand boards, newspapers, PET bottles, syringes, cotton, buckets, brooms, food waste from the classroom and laboratories.

Process of waste collection: Waste collection is being carried out within the campus throughout the day and taken for segregation.

Segregation of wastes is done under 3 categories

- Non-compostable- reusable, recyclable and non-recyclable.
- Compostable
- Hazardous

Non-compostable

These wastes are segregated category wise, packed and stored in the store room. They are sold every month.

Compostable wastes

Vegetables, fruit wastes are used to feed cattle.

Eggshells are powdered and used for plants, as they are good source of Calcium.

Peels of citric fruits such as lemon and orange are dried and used to prepare dish and floor washing powder.

Three types of composting is practiced

1. Windrow method

The grass cuttings and banana leaves are composted using window method.

2. Aerobic composting

DKMC campus has a large number of varieties of trees. The leaf litters from these trees are collected everyday and composted in wooden aerobic composting tanks for a period of 60 days. The compost is then collected and sieved. The sieved compost is used for garden or sold.

3. Vermicomposting

The un-sieved compost is transferred into the vermicompost beds. The slurry from the biogas plants, which also is an excellent bacterial inoculum, is used for vermicomposting. Once in 60 days the vermicompost is left in heaps and moisturized unti sold. Each time the earthworms are harvested and given to the worm bank.

Cow shed: A pucca cow shed is being constructed with the capacity of 20 cows. **Biogas plant:** Initially one biogas plant is constructed and it is in operation. The gas is utilized in the hostel kitchen.

Vermi bank

Our vermi bank has 3 varieties of earthworms 2 exotic varieties (*Eisenia foetida* and *Eudrilus euginiae*) and 1 indigenous variety (*Lampito mauritii*). There is around 8000 worms altogether.

Preparation of organic by products

- ➤ **Vermiwash:** Once in few weeks water is dripped into the vermicomposting units and the thick brown coloured, liquid is collected. This liquid contains the mixture of H.A. and F.A. different bacterial inoculants and also coelomic fluid of earthworms which contain a variety of plant growth promoting enzymes.
- > Amirtha karisal: This is prepared using a mixture of jaggery, cow's urine, ghee etc.,
- **Poochi virati** (Organic insecticide): This is prepared by mixing the extracts of Neem leaf extract, Neem kernel and Adathoda.
- **Humic acid**: One derived from vermicompost.

These preparations are regularly used in our garden.

- ➤ **Roof garden:** The Enviro Club feels proud to say that our college is crowned with a 505 eco-friendly bamboo baskets. There is a great demand for the organic vegetables and greens from our garden. Though the roof garden is now dismantled for construction purpose, it will be set up soon.
- ➤ **Herbal garden:** The College already has an herbal garden with around 15 types of native herbal plants. Herbal powders are prepared and sold regularly.

- > **Nursery development:** Plant saplings are grown in clean oil covers and they are also sold.
- ➤ **Fodder cultivation:** The fodder for cattle is being cultivated within the campus for which we are utilizing the partially treated waste water flowing through the canal. We have requested the district authorities to permit complete wastewater treatment to be used in fodder cultivation.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

- 1. Training given to SHG women, Municipality workers, Nerby college and school students and also for the ecoclub teachers of different schools in Vellore district on solid waste management.
- 2. Observance of World Health Day
- 3. Women Development Programme on roof gardening and organic farming.
- 4. Awareness Programme conducted for school students on
 - Pollution control
 - Hazards of Plastics
 - Global Warming
 - Zero Waste Management
 - Bio-diversity and Climatic changes
- 5. Staff members' in charge of enviroclub take utmost care to inculcate eco awareness among the students. The first year students are taken for campus visit and specially informed about the activities of enviroclub.
- 6. Project proposals based on environmental protection were called for during the year 2010 and the best two project proposals were funded by the Enviro club thus encouraging the PG and research students to take up projects in environment related areas.
- 7. Students participate in various conferences and training programmes on Biodiversity and Climate Change. They also attended the seminar cum exhibition on Agri biotechnology conducted by Agricultural Technology Management Agency, Vellore.

4. Evidence of Success

- * The college acts as a model college on zero waste management practice.
- * Many colleges and social workers of Tamil nadu, different states of India and few foreigners have visited the club activities.
- * Club members give training to the public and sanitation workers on waste management

5. Problems encountered and Resources required

- Mass ignorance and apathy towards the destruction of natural resources and pollution.
- The widespread use of materials that degrade the eco-system.

Though the college is practicing the waste management successfully it needs more support from the government to make it compulsory in all educational institutions.

BEST PRACTICE -2

Title of the Practice

Enhancing research potential in students and faculty

1. Goal

The aim of this particular practice is to provide necessary infrastructure, human resources and motivation to nurture the research competencies among the students and faculty members.

2. The Context

Our college strives to impart quality education to the rural women students. With this basic objective the college encourages the students to take up research by registering themselves to higher degree, mini projects and encouraging them to participate and present papers, posters in various seminars and workshops by providing them the required infrastructure and if needed financial support also. Similarly, the faculty members are motivated to go for higher studies to equip themselves to match with the present educational scenario. They are also encouraged to participate in various seminars, conferences and workshops by providing them the needed institutional support.

The college has 15 UG programmes, 9 PG programmes, 8 M.Phil. programmes and & 7 Departments are providing Ph.D. Programmes. The college has the sufficient infrastructural and support facilities to conduct research. The departments also have qualified staff for conducting research. With this it can be rightly said that the college is inculcating a research culture to its students.

3. Objectives

- To evolve a collective methodology by applying the concepts in various disciplines
- To look beyond the existing discipline and generate new knowledge by integrating the related disciplines
- To collate the synergic outcome of the interdisciplinary approach
- To motivate the faculty members and students to engage in research
- To become a true lifelong learner and a team player
- To suggest measures to rectify the problems faced by the society regarding Pollution, Water Analysis, Therapy, Waste Recycling and other social issues.

4. The Practice

- The college has a **study circle** in all PG departments to encourage the students and faculty members to take up exams like UGC CSIR, UGC NET in order to qualify them to undergo research.
- The college has a **Research Committee** to motivate and support the Students and faculty members to take up research. The committee monitors the research activities regularly and takes necessary steps to enhance research.
- The college encourages the students and faculty members for their publication and participation in various seminars, conferences and

- workshops by awarding **cash incentives** during the college day for their contribution to research.
- Through consultancy the research atmosphere in the institution is enriched. The prevalent research culture has motivated the staff and students to update their knowledge, which in turn contribute to their research publications.
- The library is well equipped with **WI-FI facility** and accessibility to e-journals through **Inflibnet**.
- **Biomaterials research lab is well equipped** for doing research in remediation of the water and soil pollution using low cost materials.
- **Biomaterials research lab** also supplies the materials to the industries through collaboration.
- Extension activities act as a bridge between the public and the institution.
- **UGC Grants** for the Major and Minor projects are released on time, Audit and Submission of Utilization Certificates by the Principal investigator are done within the stipulated period.
- **Seed money** to the extent of 10% of the expenditure related to the minor research project is provided by the management to faculty members and students.
- The college with the concerned departments enters into **MOU's** to extend research and exchange the innovative ideas to facilitate research.

5. Evidence of success

- Dr. P.N. Sudha is a **consultant** for Tannery, Poultry feed industries and Everest Biotech, Bangalore.
- Dr. P.N. Sudha, Principal and Dr. S. Mythili, Department of Commerce received **seed money** from the Management to the extent of 10% of the expenditure related to the research projects.
- Consultancy services are rendered by **15 faculty members** to various Universities, Colleges (Autonomous) as Board members to frame or update the syllabus.
- **Collaboration** with NIIT and other organizations had increased placement percentage. Student placement has increased the demand for the courses like Computer Science, Maths, Chemistry and Biotechnology in the college.
- As part of research activity, 37 staff members are acted as **resource persons** in various seminars, workshops and conferences.
- Staff members have contributed by publishing their research papers in referred national and international journals through which research linkages are established.
- **512 research papers** were published by our faculty members during the period 2009-2015 with the **total impact factor of 498.002**.
- Research projects funded by UGC and TNSCST, are awarded to 5 faculty members.
- The Biomaterials research group of Chemistry Department gives consultancy for M.Sc Chemistry and M.Tech. Projects in the area of preparation of Nano Biomaterials and treatment of Batch and Column absorption study.

- The research scholars of the nearby colleges are encouraged to get training in the Laboratory Techniques.
- The Microbiology Lab is widely used by Scholars of various Departments of our College and also from the nearby colleges for Anti-Microbial studies of their samples.
- Water Analysis is carried out by the Department of Chemistry for the samples of the college and the service is also extended to the general public.
- Ms. K. Sangeetha of PG Department of Chemistry received Rs. 4,000/- as seed money during the year 2009-2012 for the completion of her research project on "Fabrication of chitosan based ultrafiltration membranes for heavy metal Chromium removal".
- Ms. P. Supriya Prasad of 3rd year B.Sc Chemistry was given permission to undertake a summer project in the year 2014-2015 "
- The staff members are acting as reviewers for various Elsevier, Scopus, Taylor and Francis journals. The reviewers are provided with access to their respective website free of cost for thirty days. In this way free access to high impact factor journals are provided to the research groups.

6. Problems encountered and Resources required

Difficulty in time management for students and faculty. Mobilizing funds for the implementation part of the project.

7. Future plans

- Proposal to publish the Research Journal of the College
- Proposed to establish a research centre in the name of the secretary which include all the research departments fostering world class research

Conclusion

As evident in the report, DKM College for Women believes in and reaffirms its quality policy assimilating innovative practices that embellish its progress in the pursuit of excellence.

POST - ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES TAKEN UP BY THE COLLEGE

D.K.M College for Women was founded by a person born for the **upliftment of the downtrodden women folk** in the area, where service is needed and the great soul is Amarar Vellore N. Krishnaswamy Mudaliar. The college has been reaccredited by **NAAC** in **2009** in the second cycle. As the outcome of the reaccreditation process the college has taken significant quality sustenance and enhancement measures keeping in view the **suggestions and recommendations made by the NAAC committee**.

After series of deliberations, at various levels, innovative steps have been taken to improve the quality of the institution in the fields of Curriculum, Teaching-Learning and Evaluation, Research, Consultancy and Extension, Infrastructure and Learning resources, Student support and Progression and Governance, Leadership and Management.

ICT practices

As per the suggestions of NAAC committee, the College has started using ICT in the Curriculum by introducing skill based subjects like **E-Banking**, **E-Marketing**, **E-Commerce**, **E-Business** by the Department of Commerce. The Department of Computer Science introduced papers like "Digital Electronics and Microprocessors" and "Introduction of Information Technology" in their UG courses. The Department also introduced papers like "Principles of Compiler Design", "Distributed Computing" and "Artificial Neural Network" in their PG courses.

Value added courses have been introduced in many departments. Web based classes are taken. Also presentations and videos are used to help better understanding in students. E-Governance has been introduced for information sharing and all the departments are provided with necessary facilities. Free Laptops issued to students by the State Government is effectively used by students. The College has introduced Value added courses like Beautician course, Vegetable Carving course and Jewel making course through the Women Development Cell after the second cycle of NAAC accreditation. Department of Commerce has started Certificate course (Value added Course) on Salesmanship, Accounting and Taxation. Department of Chemistry has started Certificate course in Water Analysis, Department of Zoology and Microbiology have started Certificate course on Medical Lab Technology

(MLT) and **Department of History** has introduced a Certificate course on **E-Tourism**.

Feedback Mechanism

The Feedback on various aspects like Curriculum, Infrastructural facilities, Teaching-Learning and Office Administration is collected from the **final year students** formally. The feedback collected are analysed by the IQAC and the results are presented in a forum consisting of the Principal, Planning Board Members and the HODs of the Departments. After thorough discussions, required remedial actions are taken.

The College has a **mechanism to collect feedback** from the **stakeholders like students, parents, alumni, teachers and office staff.** A **SWOC analysis** is conducted by **IQAC** and the details are presented to the Principal and after further deliberations at all levels necessary actions are taken.

Modern Teaching Learning Process

Modern Teaching-Learning aids like **LCD projectors**, **OHPs and SMART** class room facilities are utilised in an exhaustive manner. The College has **Wi-Fi facility** to enable **ICT teaching** and learning method.

CBCS Pattern of Curriculum

The **CBCS pattern** has been introduced in the curriculum for all the UG and PG courses from the academic year 2009-10 immediately after the second cycle of NAAC committee visit.

Research

The college has moved towards fostering a research culture in the Campus. A **research committee** is functioning which constitutes the senior most member as head and representatives from departments offering Ph.D. programmes. Several research committee meetings were held and guidelines were formulated to monitor research activities in the college. The Committee **motivates** the faculty members to undertake **major and minor projects** funded by various organisations like UGC. The Research committee actively functions for the development of research by encouraging the staff and students to **publish papers in referred journals, participate and present papers** in **seminars and conferences**. All departments organise seminars/conferences

/workshops related to research. One workshop on research was conducted by IQAC on the topic "Quality Assurance in Autonomous colleges through IQAC".

After the due assessment of the needs of the society, in the year 2009 Department of Chemistry got affiliation for Full time **Ph.D** programme. In the year 2013 **five departments** namely Department of History (FT/PT), Department of Commerce (FT/PT), Department of Mathematics (FT/PT), Department of Zoology (FT/PT) and Staff of Department of Economics and English got guideship for Ph.D (PT) programmes and Department of Microbiology (PT) got affiliation for Ph.D programme in 2014. **UG course** B.Sc., Psychology is introduced during 2014-15 to cater to the needs of the student society. Proposals were made in 2014-15 for the introduction of B.Com.,(Computer Applications), B.A., Tamil and B.Sc., Mathematics and have been implemented during the current year.

After the NAAC visit in 2009 many of our faculty members registered and completed their Ph.D. At present there are **22 faculty members with Ph.D. 7 of them are acting as Ph.D supervisors. 15 have registered for Ph.D** among which few of them are nearing completion. The staff and students have published around **513 papers** in the International and National journals. In order to inculcate research culture among students mini project for UG students has been introduced with an **extra credit** in the curriculum.

Collaboration

MOUS signed with the following institutions NIIT Vellore Centre, Wishva Computer Academy Pvt. Ltd, Speak for Sure, Shree Hayagreeva Academy, Vellore Leathers, Central Museum, Chennai and letter of intent has been obtained from the following companies to enable industry institution linkage Grace diagnostics centre, Microlabs, Thyrocare Services, Asian Educational Institutions, Mumme Hospital, A.A. Child Care Centre, Vellore Co-Operative Town Bank Ltd and Aavin Milk Society for training and placement assistance.

Management as an incentive towards promotion of research began to felicitate the faculty members who actively participate in research activities by publishing articles in the referred journals, presentation of research papers in various seminars and conferences. During the year 2014- 15 the Management felicitated the faculty members by giving around Rs. 75,000 as **cash awards**.

Consultancy

During the last 5 years, **Biomaterials Lab of Chemistry** department has been updated with the latest technologies from time to time to conduct research and exchange services with other institutions. The possibilities of collaboration has began to be explored with rigour and guidelines have been formulated for structured consultancy. Consultancy has been provided to tanneries and other research scholars and industries on water related issues.

Infrastructural facilities

Keeping in tune with the vertical and horizontal growth of the institution over a period of time, several initiatives have been taken to improve the infrastructural facilities of the college. The built in area has been increased to extent of 57,820 Sq.ft. The **library** has been divided into two sections one is provided for Circulation and the other section in only for References. There also a **Network Resource Centre** which helps the inmates to use the internet sources effectively. The library has introduced Bar Code System for the accession of books.

The Language Lab is been updated and the maximum usage of the same is recorded. A Mini IQAC conference Hall has been established to conduct formal meeting with WiFi facility. Computers with WiFi facility have been provided to all the departments in the Aided Stream. Research room has been established separately with WiFi facility for the benefit of the research scholars.

The campus infrastructure has been modified wherever possible to aid mobility of physically challenged students. Ramps and lifts have been provided especially for the disabled students to have easy access to classrooms.

The college has initiated **coaching classes** for Competitive Exams like NET/SET, TNPSC and UPSC through the Study Circle which is actively functioning to coach both Students and Faculty Members to take up the Competitive Exams for their professional development.

A **Log Book** was introduced to orient the staff members towards Systematic planning of their teaching and administrative tasks and review them periodically. The office of controller of examinations has introduced **online publication of results** after the NAAC committee visit. The examination fees is collected in the campus by the bank which has facilitated the students to easily remit their examination fees within the campus. New initiatives are taken to improve the **security facilities** in the mark sheets.

Besides functioning of Antiragging cell and Grievance Redressal cell, the college has proposed to form **Antisexual Harrassment cell** that ensures students safety.

Proposals sent to UGC

A proposal has been sent to UGC for establishment of **Women development cell** for funding during 2013-14. But, the cell is actively functioning by organising various awareness programmes on women health and other social issues. The cell has started skill based training programme namely Nutrition course, Vegetable carving and Jewel making and Cosmetology course.

The college has taken the initiatives to provide safe drinking water to the students through **RO** and other water purifier system to staff and students. The College has established **zero waste management** system for source segregation of solid waste and safe disposal of the same. The Microbial analysis of air quality and water quality is being tested by the Department of Microbiology since 2012-13.

The college has sent proposals for funding under BSR Scheme, Establishment of women study centre, Financial Assistance for the Scheme of NET Coaching for SC/ST & Minorities, Financial Assistance for the Scheme of Remedial Coaching for SC/ST/OBC & Minorities, Financial Assistance for the scheme for Equal Opportunity Cell, Financial Assistance for the Scheme for entry in services for SC/ST/OBC and minorities, scheme "Colleges with Potential for Excellence", Deen Dayal Upadhyay centres for Knowledge Acquisition and Upgradation of Skilled Human Abilities and Livelihood (KAUSHAL), Community Colleges and B.Voc Courses.

Thus the college has experienced a sizable growth in academics, Infrastructure, Research, extension activities, sports and E governance. Thus self evaluation and evaluation by external experts makes the campus very vibrant and helps the students experience more from their college education.
